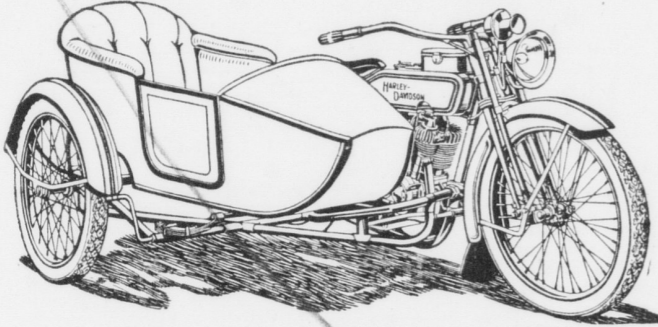

FOR BETTER PUBLIC HEALTH CONDITIONS IN OUR STATE

There has been no more serious and compelling need brought out by war experiences in this country than that of improving the public health. The examination of men for the army brought to light many thousands of cases of tuberculosis that were not known to exist. It was also found that a majority of the young men of the country were physically unfit for admission to the army.

An interesting and valuable contribution to the campaign for better public health conditions in our State is the recently issued Yera Book of the Pennsylvania Society for the Prevention of Tuberculosis. This attractive booklet has been published for the purpose of making public the report of the Tuberculosis Society and with a view to stimulating and strengthening the fight being waged against tuberculosis.

It is encouraging to learn that during the last year much progress has been made in the direction of placing the work of the Pennsylvania Society and its affiliated organizations on a basis to take a more effective part than ever in the effort to stamp out tuberculosis. This Society was organized a quarter of a century ago. It now has branches and committees in every section of the State. Many of the branch organizations have full-time trained workers employed and are vigorously at work throughout the year. Hundreds of citizens, both men and women, are in this way enlisted in the movement to "Build up Health."

It is now recognized on every hand that the chief hope of bringing about the improvement in health conditions that is needed lies in an aroused and active interest on the part of the rank and file of citizens. Health education is the thing needed above all else in this problem. The Pennsylvania Tuberculosis Society is working to help meet this need.

The activities of the Society are supported almost entirely with funds raised through the Christmas seal sale. Plans are now being made for the sale of these little health messages next December. The sale is expected to be the largest in the history of the organized tuberculosis movement.

STATE MAY NOW BUY THE GAME PRESERVES

Governor Sproul has approved the bill to enable the State Game Commission or Department of Conservation to invest not over \$50,000 a year from the hunters' license funds for purchase of lands for State game preserves and to receive lands for such purposes through donations.

This bill, presented by Mr. Bowman, Cumberland, is designed to enable the State to own preserves in counties where the State does not own forest reserves, such lands having been the only ones available for game preserves heretofore. The State owns forest lands in less than half the counties of the State. Under the terms of the bill the State may acquire lands on which mineral, oil or gas rights are reserved. No land can be bought or more than \$10 an acre except where buildings or cultivated lands are included.

The Commission or Department is to have authority to erect such buildings and make such provisions as is necessary to operate the preserves and the control is to be vested in the Commission or Department. Taxes are to be paid on the same plan as those paid on State forests and out of the license proceeds.

The bill has been much advocated by sportsmen, especially in the western part of the state where it is to establish preserves.

PIGEONS CARRY SCORES TO YORY COUNTY FANS

Baseball scores by innings carried to the fans at home is the novel experiment successfully carried out by the Red Lion base ball club through the co-operation of members of the town pigeon association. When playing a game away from home, the Red Lion Club carries a dozen or so homing pigeons along, and one is released at the close of each inning of the game, with the score for that inning attached to its leg.

The stunt was tried out with great success at Dallastown, York county. The folks at home received reports at about five minute intervals, and they claim that it beats the telephone method of sending the news "by a mile."

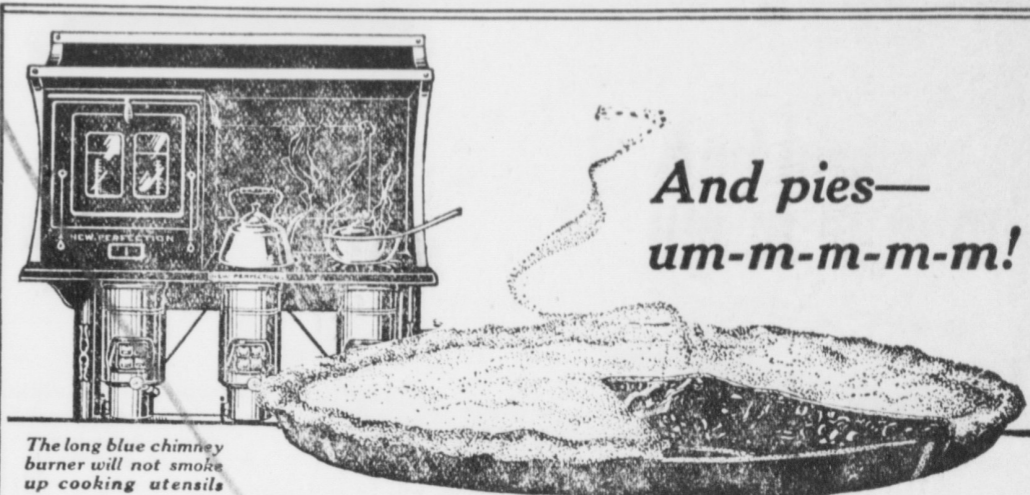
The Lutheran Sunday School was held on Sunday morning at 9:30. Preaching at 7:30 by a supply from Harrisburg.

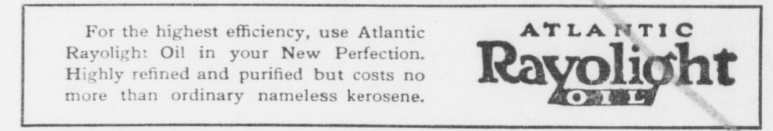
