

MEMORIAL IN HONOR OF ONE OF ITS MEMBERS

On Sunday afternoon at three o'clock the Maytown Alumni held a memorial service in the Lutheran church at Maytown in memory of Sergeant Oliver Shields, who died while serving his country in the late war as a member of the United States Marines. This Alumni Association had forty-nine of its members at the front. Sergeant Shields of Marietta, was the only one to lose his life. The memorial address was delivered by Lieutenant Mervin E. Bran and a special program was rendered. Sergeant Shields died in a hospital last November and was buried in the Marietta cemetery with military honors.

SUSQUEHANNA SURVEY WILL BEGIN AT ONCE Harrisburg, July 24—Survey of

the Susquehanna river from Harrisburg to its mouth will begin at once, according to Secretary James F. Woodward, State Secretary of Internal Affairs, who announced today he had received a communication from E. J. Loving, colonel, of the U. S. Engineering Office of the War Department, assigned to the work. In the Rivers and Harbors act passed by Congress last March provisions for a survey and preliminary examination were made. It was not known until today, however, that actual work was to start so soon.

ALL GARAGE MEN MUST KEEP COMPLETE RECORDS

Proprietors of public garages throughout Pennsylvania have been notified by letter to the provisions of the act approved by Governor Sproul June 30th, requiring that records be kept of all cars stored or left for repairs in every garage in the state. A special form has been prepared by the State Highway Department; and this must be used by the garage men. Records must be kept in ink or indelible pencil and shall be open to inspection of police or authorities for one year from date. A stiff fine is provided for failure to maintain the record.

Police authorities declare that the keeping of these records will do much to end the stealing of automobiles. The record sheet contains spaces wherein a complete description of the car is kept—the make of machine, manufacturer's number, the make of engine, number of engine, and other information. The sheet has been prepared so that it will be of great assistance to garage men in keeping "tabs" on their business.

Highway Commissioner Sadler in his letter to garage owners and operators sets forth the entire section covering record keeping. It is section 8 of House Bill 395 (Act 284), as follows:

"That the proprietor of every public garage and motor vehicle repair shop shall cause a record to be kept after the manner to be prescribed by the State Highway Commissioner of the names of any and all persons owning or having charge of any motor vehicle stored, left for repair, or any other purpose at any such public garage or motor vehicle repair shop together with the make, manufacturer's number, name of the registration and the registration number of such motor vehicle. Such record shall be kept in ink or indelible pencil and shall be open to the inspection of police officers or other proper authorities. Such records shall be retained and be available for a period of one year after entry but not thereafter. He shall also immediately notify the local police authorities and State Highway Commissioner of any such motor vehicle whereon the manufacturer's number or mark has apparently been altered, obliterated or removed." With the Highway Department receiving complete information concerning stolen cars, and garages keeping records of cars received or stored, it will be possible quickly to locate stolen automobiles if they remain in Pennsylvania.

He Changed His Mind On September 10, 1918 I. Kuntzelman, postmaster of Bainbridge, Pa., sent his resignation to the Post Office Department, Washington, D. C. An examination was held and Mr. H. Wilson Snyder was appointed to the office but died before filling his bond.

Another examination was announced to be held at Marietta, Pa., July 12, 1919, but was withdrawn by the Department. Through the persuasion of some of the patrons of the office Mr. Kuntzelman has consented to continue his service and through their efforts he has been reinstated. He has now entered on his twenty-first year of service.

License Money Returned At Middletown liquor dealers will be returned a portion of their 1918 and 1919 license money for the time their establishments were closed under the Federal ban, which ruled that no such place should be allowed inside a half mile radius of the Aviation and Ordnance Depots. Of the money to be returned the borough of Middletown will pay sixty per cent, the county fifteen per cent, and the State twenty-five per cent.

Tobacco Sold for Export I. H. Weaver & Co. have just purchased from the Seed Leaf Tobacco Growers' Association, of Lancaster, its packing of fillers of 1918 tobacco, 648 cases. And the same firm has purchased from Frank McGrann, 28 acres of 1918 tobacco from his three farms. Most of that tobacco will be exported.

STATE "REWARDS" TO THE TOWNSHIPS FOR GOOD ROADS

Harrisburg, Pa., July 23—Governor William C. Sproul has signed the bill providing for a system of State "rewards" to townships for the construction of township roads, and for the erection and construction of township bridges, in townships of the second class. An appropriation will be available beginning Dec. 1, 1919. The new law takes the form of that which provided for bonuses of 50 per cent, of the amount expended by townships for road work, not exceeding \$20 per mile.

By the terms of the new law the State Highway Department will pay rewards when work by the township has been completed and inspected. Rewards will be granted by the Commonwealth for improvements of the following nature: Grading and draining a section of road not less than half a mile long; graveling or cindering a graded and drained road not less than half a mile in length; for macadamizing a road or for constructing a Telford macadam road not less than half a mile long; for constructing a concrete, brick or bituminous surfaced road of not less than half a mile in length; for the erection and construction of bridges of three feet or more span, constructed of concrete or stone or a combination of concrete and stone, or a steel bridge with a floor constructed of materials approved by the State Highway Department; and for the purchase and installation of culvert and drain pipes.

The rewards are to equal 33 and one-third per cent, of the cost of the proposed improvements, not to exceed certain sums. All of these rewards will be based on roads, the improvement for which is to be a width of not less than sixteen feet; and a corresponding reduction or addition in the amount of the reward will be made as the width of the improved road is increased or reduced; but no rewards shall be made for the improvement of any road less than twelve feet wide.

LAST LEG TO FREE THE COUNTY OF TOLL ROADS

The Free Highways Association, C. A. B. Zook, Chairman, is off on the last leg of the campaign to free the county of toll roads and to give to every citizen of the county a good road to get to the business centers. The outlook now is that the latter part of the campaign will be as successful as the first, which speedily freed the county of the toll roads running each way on the Lincoln Highway.

The Free Highway Association is composed of all the civic bodied of the county and in its early campaign was backed by every newspaper in the county, a most unusual thing. The free Highways Association was gathered by the Lancaster Automobile Club leaders and the auto club members who jumped into the fray were the "pep" kind, which brought free roads victory to their standard over opposition, which until the Free Highways Association got into action, had been impregnable.

The launching of a new campaign will likely bring even greater results than the original campaign because there are more people interested; more people who see the great advantage of good roads and free roads than there were when Mr. Zook and his fellow auto club members launched their Free Highways Association at that memorable meeting at the Stevens House. Quite naturally, the Free Highways Association can carry on this campaign better than any other because it is composed of and is backed by every civic organization, hence to no one organization can go all the credit. The Mount Joy Bulletin long extolled of good roads and free roads, congratulated the Free Highways Association on its latest move, and, calling on every organization, male and individual in the county to join in, wishes the Association greater success than in the past, when its score was perfect.

PROVISIONS OF DRY ENFORCEMENT BILL

The prohibition enforcement bill, as it passed the House, provides: After January 26, 1920: Every person, permitted under the law to have liquor in his possession shall report the quantity and kind to the commissioners of internal revenue. (This applies to chemists, physicians, etc.)

After February 1, 1920: The possession of any liquor, other than authorized by the law, shall be prima facie evidence that it is being kept for sale or otherwise in violation of the law.

It will not be required, however, to report, and it will not be illegal to have in one's possession liquor in a private dwelling while the same is occupied and used by the possessor as his private dwelling and the liquor is used for personal consumption by the owner, his family or his guests.

The possessor of such liquors bears the burden of proof that the liquor was acquired and is possessed lawfully.

Intoxicating liquor is defined as a beverage containing more than one-half per cent, of alcohol.

Any house, boat, vehicle, or other place where liquor is manufactured or sold is declared a nuisance.

No person shall manufacture, sell, barter, give away, transport, import, export, deliver, furnish, or receive any intoxicating liquors.

Liquor for non-beverage purposes and wine for sacramental use may be sold under specified regulations. Denatured alcohol, medicinal preparations (including patent medicines) unfit for beverage purposes, toilet articles, flavoring extracts and vinegar are exempted.

Registered physicians are authorized to issue prescriptions under strict regulations for the use of liquors where it may be necessary as a medicine.

Liquor advertisements of all kinds are prohibited. Sale, manufacture or distribution of compounds intended for use in the unlawful manufacture of liquor is prohibited, together with sale or publication of recipes for home manufacture.

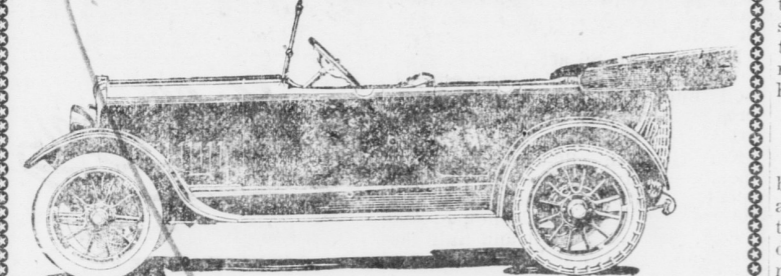
