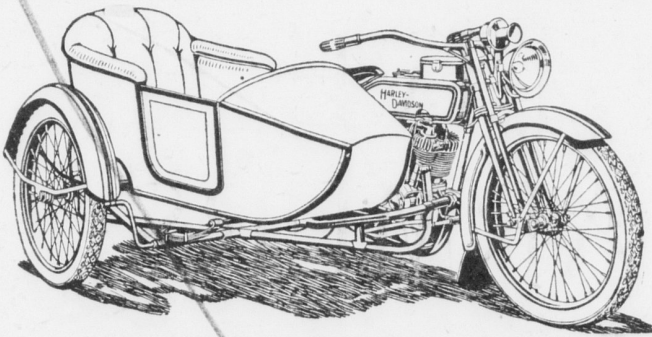

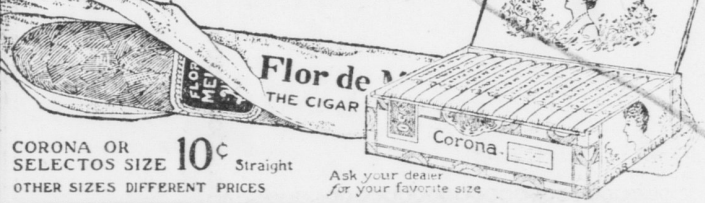

BIG CAMP OPENED AT LANDISVILLE

DAILY MEETINGS ARE BEING HELD THERE—RECORD CROWD SUNDAY—MANY CAMPERS THIS SEASON

Landisville campmeeting is on once more. The season of 1919 opened Thursday evening with an attendance larger than for the past several years, as well as more cottages permanently located in the picturesque grove. The grounds are in splendid condition and remodeled and newly painted cottages greet the eye. The rains of the past weeks have left everything refreshed and in finest of fulsome verdure of trees and greenward. Ferns and flowers adorn the porches and plots of many cottages. Hoffman, of Reading, who at 10 o'clock each morning conducts the praise service, and Prof. A. Casselberry, of Philadelphia, the popular song leader of the camp.

The sermon Friday afternoon was delivered by Rev. S. R. Dout, of Ardmore, who spoke again on Friday evening. The regular preaching service was preceded by a twilight service conducted by Rev. L. R. Thompson, of Reading. Rev. Dout was the Landisville camp leader of the young people's meeting two years ago, but enlisted in the national service and served as a U. S. Chaplain a period of one year.

Miss Snyder, of Lancaster, is making an effort to establish a class of boys and girls in nature study. The grove with its many and various trees affords ample opportunity for this work. She is encouraging the planting of memorial trees in the grove in honor of the leaders who in the past wrought faithfully and effectively in the historic campmeetings.

An innovation this year consists of the three special days to be observed this week: Prohibition Day on Tuesday, Patriotic Day on Wednesday and Home Missionary Day on Thursday.

The tabernacle bell sounding through the woods presages a most enjoyable and successful campmeeting season this year, according to all indications declare the officers and leaders at Landisville.
