#### EXCAVATING IS ABOUT COMPLETED

**WORK ON WALLS OF NEW SHOE FACTORY WILL BEGIN AT ONCE—NEW OFFICERS ELECTED—FIRST STOCK CALL FOR STOCK**

At a meeting of the stock holders of the Gerberich-Payne Shoe Company, at the office of their attorney, at Harrisburg on Thursday, September 4th, it was decided to apply for a certificate of incorporation. The corporation name will be the Gerberich-Payne Shoe Company and the following officers were elected: E. S. Gerberich, Middletown, President; Clyde E. Gerberich, Middletown, Secretary and Frank Payne, Harrisburg, Treasurer.

At this meeting it was decided to call for the first payment of twenty per cent. of the subscription of the capital stock to be made payable November 15. Payment can be made to either the First National Bank or the Union National Bank of this place or at the office of the company. Receipts will be issued when payment is made and a temporary stock certificate will be issued showing the amount paid and the rate of interest at the rate of six per cent. beginning Nov. 15.

The building will be built of brick and reinforced concrete walls, four stories high and a basement for five working floors.
