HORSE DRAWN VEHICLES MUST DISPLAY LIGHTS

Harrisburg, Sept. 6—Governor William C. Sproul, on June 12, approved the bill which provides that after July 1, 1919, all horse-drawn vehicles must display at least one white light which must be clearly visible for a distance of at least two hundred feet from both the front and the rear of such vehicles. This law applies to all vehicles except agricultural machinery and such as are propelled by hand or are loaded with hay or straw in bulk, while standing or in motion on any public highway in the State. Enforcement of this act is up to the local authorities. In some sections of the State the law is being observed and in others it is not. A fine of from \$2 to \$5 or imprisonment for five days, may be collected for each offense following conviction before any burgess, alderman, magistrate or justice of the peace. Similar punishment may be meted out to drivers of slow-moving or heavily laden vehicles, which when overtaken by another vehicle traveling at a greater speed, shall refuse to allow such other vehicle passage to the left. The same act prohibits passing street cars on the side on which passengers get on or off until the car has started and until any passenger shall have reached the side of the highway.
