**ROWENNA COUPLE OBSERVE
 69th WEDDING ANNIVERSARY**

Mr. and Mrs. Elias Fisher, native
 of Rowenna, have been married
 sixty-nine years. They are at present
 in Newport, receiving congratula-
 tions upon the celebration of this an-
 niversary. Before the time of the
 railroads, sixty-nine years ago, Mr.
 Fisher and his bride-to-be, Miss
 Elizabeth McClure, of near Marietta
 drove to Harrisburg, where they
 were married. The officiating clergy
 man was Rev. L. Gearhart, a min-
 ister of the Lutheran church. Mr.
 Fisher was left an orphan at the
 age of ten years, his father having met
 his death by being killed in a run-
 away accident.

He was born June 30, 1830; his
 wife was born March 9, 1828, daugh-
 ter of James and Elizabeth McClure,
 pioneer residents of near Marietta.
 Her father died at the age of 92
 years, and a sister of hers died about
 five years ago at the age of 94.
 Mr. Fisher was twenty years af-
 filiated with the old Chickies fur-
 naces, which are now torn down,
 being one of the first men to work
 there. There are at present none
 living except him of "his gang."
 Their marriage was blessed with
 eight children. There are many
 grandchildren and great-grand-
 children in the family.

Mrs. Fisher has the distinction of
 being the first woman to ride in the
 eastern part of this State on a rail-
 road train, as she was living at Ro-
 wenna, and when the road was near-
 ly completed, rode in the cabin of
 the engine to Marietta. The road was
 finished three days later, and then
 opened for travel.
