MANY FARMERS THRUOUT THIS SECTION WON PRIZES AT THE STATE SHOW AT HARRISBURG

A State Farm Products show was held at Harrisburg last Tuesday, a feature of which was a competitive exhibit of tobacco by the various growers. There were about 125 tobacco farmers in competition. J. H. Hostetter, of Millersville, submitted samples of the sixty-eight crop he has grown and was the winner in Class 1, easily carrying off the

When interviewed P. W. Baker. the extensive tobacco grower, of Landisville, who judged the exhibit, said it was undoubtedly the most creditable display of Lancaster county tobacco ever made. "There has never been such a handsome showing," he declared enthusiastically, "and it emphatically proves the educa-tional value of the shows, both locally and State-wide, that have been held the past few years. Both Lan-caster and Clinton counties did themselves proud."

There were about 125 growers in competition, and the exhibit were seedleaf and Havana.

The prize winners from this locality are as follows: Martin Swarr, Landisville, first on seedleaf binders in Class 2, while L. H. Mease, also of Landisville, took second prize in the same class.
