More Than 1,000,000 Face Death Is Message Brought by Miss Dakesian.
Imagine a bread line of 120,000 famished people waiting for twenty-four hours a day for the dole of food that is the sole barrier between them and death from starvation. That is the situation in Alexandropol, a city in Russian Armenia, according to Miss Hermine Dakesian, a pretty Armenian girl, one of the survivors of four years



of the horrors of Turkish massacres and deportations. Saved by an American woman, she has come to this country and entered Oberlin College. With her come fourteen other Armenian girls in charge of Miss Adelaide S. Dwlght, a Near East Relief worker, who has been instrumental in helping to save hundreds of thousands of their people from death by starvation. Miss Dwlght, who is not given to exaggeration and has seen conditions at first hand, says more than a million people are facing death by starvation in Armenia and will perish unless America aids. Herself an eyewitness to the slaughter of hundreds of helpless women and children by the Turks and a victim of the deportations, Miss Dakesian, an unusually pretty girl, says there is untold suffering in Armenia and Syria. She praises the efforts of the Near East Relief, formerly the American Committee for Armenian and Syrian Relief, to save as many of these people as possible. At Erivan, the capital of the Armenian republic, one hot men is given out daily, and by this relief alone the city's death rate has been cut from a thousand daily to an average of twenty. At Alexandropol, where the refugees from Turkish Armenia were driven by thousands, the situation is appalling, Miss Dakesian says. It is to avert these wholesale deaths that Near East Relief is making a nation-wide appeal for funds.

Come To The Tractor School
AND LEARN HOW TO GET BETTER SERVICE OUT OF YOUR TRACTOR
If you have none, come anyway, if you are interested in power farming. The tractor is going to be one of the most important machines on the farm during the coming years. It is the farmer's power plant. When he buys it, he often disposes of some other sources of power and depends upon the tractor to do certain kinds of work. Should the machine get out of order, this work stops, and he must wait until help comes from a neighboring town. If he knows how to locate trouble when it occurs and make minor repairs—if he understands the tractor so well that he can tell by the symptoms that trouble is likely to occur, he can overcome this trouble and save much valuable time and expense for himself as well as the maker of the tractor.
To this end, the International Harvester Company of America proposes to hold in various parts of the country a number of tractor schools. One will be held near you soon.
WHO TEACHES AND WHAT IS TAUGHT
The school is to be conducted by practical tractor men who have had long experience in handling farm tractors. They will give lectures on many subjects of interest to tractor owners and those interested in power farming. Some of the points that will be brought up are: What takes place inside of an engine when it is in operation; why it is necessary to follow certain instructions laid down by the manufacturers of a tractor; the symptoms of a tractor or engine which indicate trouble; how to prevent this trouble; how to look for causes of trouble and not overlook them. Many other subjects you will want to hear about will be discussed at this school.

The school is free to anybody interested in power farming. All the material necessary for the school work will be furnished.
