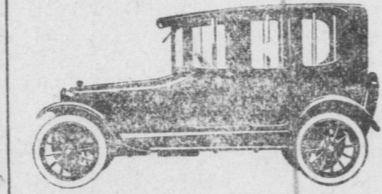

The stockholders present at the Annual Meeting of the Bachman Chocolate Manufacturing Company held in Mount Joy on January 19, 1920, will recall that at that time the President referred to the above capitalization plan which was discussed at length and favorably commented upon and therefore is not news to most stockholders.

The President pointed out at that time that now at least three times the capital was necessary to do the same amount of business compared with 1915 conditions.

This recapitalization plan has not been suggested with the idea of expanding the business in a wild or unreasonable manner, but simply to provide for the actual requirements of a conservative business.

The Board of Directors being in close touch with every phase of the business are in harmony with the future plans of the Company and approve thoroughly believing this move to be consistent with present business conditions and ask your approval at the meeting called for this purpose.
