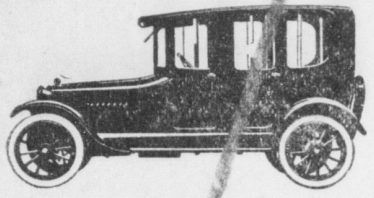

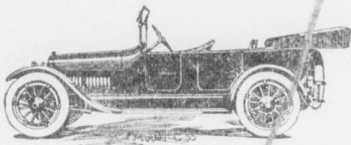

THE PRODUCE AND LIVE STOCK MARKET

CORRECT INFORMATION FURNISHED WEEKLY BY THE PENNA. BUREAU OF MARKETS FOR THE BULLETIN

Herewith is a corrected weekly report of the Lancaster markets relative to produce and live stock:

Lancaster Live Stock Market
This week's receipts were practically confined to shipments from Pennsylvania, due to Railroad embargoes and general strike conditions. Choice Steers were plentiful and prices higher. Other grades bringing better prices than the week previous. The number of animals driven in from nearby farms, reached the highest point in years, and were of excellent quality and weight. Market conditions are expected to return to normal with the settlement of the Labor disputes. Prices slightly declined at close of Market and the prospects are, they will go still lower.

87 cars from Penna., 1 car from New York. 1645 animals driven in from nearby farms.

Lancaster Produce Market
Due to strike conditions there were practically no shipments by Railroad. Dealers were compelled to resort to deliveries by truck, with the result that the supply was very limited. Prices showed a slight advance over the week previous. Potatoes especially, with prospects of a further advance. Market active. Demand normal. Quality and conditions good.
