BIG INCREASE IN THE OLD PENSIONS

JUMP OF ABOUT EIGHTY PER CENT. IS MADE UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF THE NEW PENSION LAW

The new pension law for 1812 Mexican and Civil War veterans and their widows, has become a law. The Federal administration will mail at the increased rates on the regular

pay days. About six hundred are affected by the increase, which is a jump of from \$30 to \$50 on the average. The provisions of the new pension law summarized are:

War of 1812 1-To widow of one who served in war of 1812, \$30. War With Mexico

2-To one who served 60 days or more, \$50. 3-To one who served 60 days or nore, who is helpless or blind, or so

nearly as to require personal aid and attendance, \$72. 4-To widow of one who served 60 days or more, \$30. Civil War

5-To one who served 90 days or more in the army, navy or marine corps of the United States, \$50. 6—To one who served less than 90 days, discharged for disability incurred in service in line of duty, in receipt of or entitled to pension, or on pension roll as a Civil War

veteran, \$80. 7-To one who served 90 days, honorably discharged, or having served less than 90 days, discharged for disability incurred in service in line of duty, or on the roll as a Civil War veteran, who helpless or blind or so nearly helpless or blind as to require personal aid and attendance
