Lancaster Live Stock Market
With the arrival of several cars of Western cattle the market went to pieces and the prices dropped from 50c to \$1.00 below last week's.

Choice to prime steers were a drug on the market, buyers preferring the cheaper grades. Bulls and cows held fairly steady, while hogs and calves joined in the slump. The outlook for the coming week is very discouraging, and still lower prices are looked for.

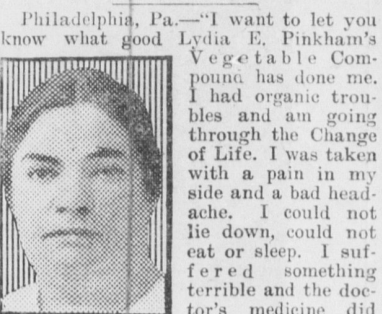

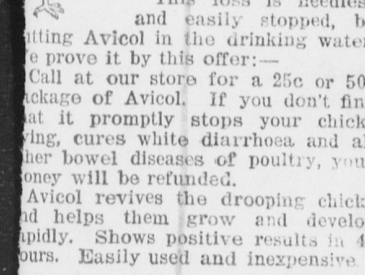

MANY TREES PLANTED IN LANCASTER COUNTY

Harrisburg, Pa.—More than 600 young forest trees were planted on private lands in Lancaster county this spring, according to a report issued today by Gifford Pinchot, Chief Forester of the Pennsylvania Department of Forestry. Trees were supplied without cost to the 17 planters in that county by the States Forestry Department.

The plantings were made as follows: White Pine, 12,000; Jack Pine, 4,450; Norway Spruce, 11,000, and others, 7,340.

Throughout the State, more than 2,700,000 seedlings were set out by private planters. Approximately, 300,000 additional trees were planted on State forests.

The largest number of seedlings, 198,700, were set out in Lackawanna county, where there were 11 planting operations. In Columbia county, there were the largest number of private planting operations, 135,760 seedlings being set out by 57 individuals.
