SHOT WIFE IN DARK; SUSPECTED BURGLAR

Some time during the night Mr. Herr heard strange noises and jumped from his bed and procured a revolver. Unbeknown to him his wife had arisen and was seeking a light. As she brushed against him in the darkness he thought a burglar had entered the bedroom by an open window and fired twice in quick succession. His wife's screams proved his mistake and when a light was finally secured it was found that one bullet had passed through Mrs. Herr's arm and the other had gone through her night gown across the abdomen, but did not touch the flesh. The wound in the arm is not serious and was dressed by Dr. Ringwalt, of Rohrstown.

A RECKLESS AUTOIST FRIGHTENS MAN'S HORSE

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AUTO TRUCK RUN WAS A SUCCESS

BIG DEMONSTRATION GIVEN HERE ON SATURDAY—MR. H. S. NEWCOMER ADDRESS LARGE GATHERING

Auto trade dealers closed Saturday what they believe to have been the most successful truck show ever held in this county, and one of the most successful educational tours of the 100 going on throughout the country during the National "Ship-By-Truck" week.

Starting out on the last day of the tour, the caravan found crowds awaiting them in each town and were received with enthusiasm. The trips were made in record time, always arriving ahead of time for the meeting. Crowds, however, were always present waiting for the trucks to appear.

The truck parade went first to Mountville, then visited Columbia, Marietta, Maytown, Elizabethtown, Mount Joy, Manheim and East Petersburg.

H. S. Rich, banker, delivered an address at the Marietta meeting which was carried out on the minute. Maytown and Elizabethtown were next on the list. At the latter place the party stopped for lunch. At Manheim the meeting was addressed by H. E. Trout, editor of the Manheim "Sentinel," and Mr. Joy by H. S. Newcomer. All of the speakers emphasized the need of good roads and the supremacy of motor truck transportation.

The caravan started out Thursday as a part of the program of the National Association in conducting an educational tour to attend to business, emphasizing the facilities of ship-by-truck system. Local truck dealers immediately fell in with the suggestion.
