FOREIGN BUYERS ARE HERE AFTER TOBACCO

Representatives from Belgium and France are in Lancaster County for the purpose of establishing a station here for the exporting of tobacco. A big corporation is about to be formed, which will include a number of local tobacco dealers.

That Lancaster County tobacco is wanted in European countries has been evident for some time. A number of New York and local packers have been exporting the weed to Europe for a number of years. The greater it is of the poorer grade.

A large amount of tobacco was shipped to Holland and Germany early this year, but has not been disposed of because of a dispute over contracts. Several thousand cases were returned to this country while big lots are being held in storage in those countries.

Plans of doing business by the new company have not as yet been made public. It is understood headquarters will be in Lancaster with warehouses for receiving tobacco both here and in various sections of the county.

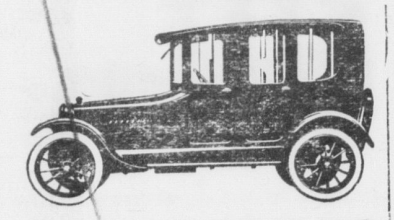
The many friends of Mr. J. H. Haldeman, our local produce dealer, who has been confined to his bed the past week with a severe attack of sickness is slowly recovering.
