Herewith is a corrected weekly report of the Lancaster markets relative to produce and live stock:

Lancaster Retail Produce Market

Buring the past week home grown vegetables and fruits of all kinds have increased in supply and show an improvement in both quality and condition. Corn which was out of the reach of the ordinary purse can now be bought as low as 25c per dozen and is of fine quality. Some choice yellow Bantam and well filled ears of other varieties brought as high as 50c but the bulk sold around 30c. Apples are also plentiful and are selling at lower prices. Peaches are increasing in supply and some fine specimens of sprayed fruit were offered. Beans of both varieties are still plentiful and can be bought at pracically your own price. Potatoes continue to flood the market and show a downward endency. Pickles of all shapes and sizes in good supply and reasonable in price. Raspberries are about over. Eggs took an upward jump and went shigh as 54c per dozen but toward the close were offered at 50c per dozen. Butter and dressed poultry remain at about the same price.
