## THE PRODUCE AND LIVE STOCK MARKET

CORRECT INFORMATION FURNISHED WEEKLY BY THE PENNA. BUREAU OF MARKETS FOR THE BULLETIN

Herewith is a corrected weekly report of the Lancaster markets relative to produce and live stock:

**Lancaster Retail Produce Market**  
During the past week home grown vegetables and fruits of all kinds have increased in supply and show an improvement in both quality and condition. Corn which was out of the reach of the ordinary purchaser can now be bought as low as 25c per dozen and is of fine quality. Some choice yellow Bantam and we filled ears of other varieties which were offered but the bulk sold around 30c. Apples are also plentiful and are selling at lower prices. Peaches are increasing in supply and some fine specimens of sprays from the orchards of all shapes and sizes in good supply and reasonable in price. Raspberries are about over. Eggs took an upward jump and went as high as 54c per dozen but toward the close were offered at 50c per dozen. Butter and dressed poultry remain at about the same price.

Beans: Green home grown 15c per 1/2 peck. Yellow wax 15a20c per 1/2 peck; excellent quality and condition. Lima Beans 25c per pint box.  
Red Beets: Home grown good quality and condition 5a10c per bunch.  
Cabbage: Home grown supply good excellent quality and condition 5a10a15c per head.  
Cauliflower: Home grown supply limited fair quality 15a30c per head.  
Corn: Home grown supply good, good quality 25a40c per doz. mostly 30c.  
Celery: Home grown supply limited fairly good 10a12c per stalk.  
Cucumbers: Supply good 3a5c each. Home grown pickles 10c doz.; 40a75c per 100.  
Carrots: Good supply and condition 5a10c per bunch.  
Egg Plants: Fair quality medium supply 10a15a20c each.  
Lettuce: Home grown good supply and condition 10a15a20c head. Romaine 8a10c per head.  
Onions: Yellow Bermudas condition variable 10c per box. Green 5a10c per bunch. Crystal white wax quality and condition good 10c per box. Spanish 5a10c each.  
Peppers: Good quality 1a3a5c ea.  
Peas: Green 40a50c per 1/2 peck supply limited. Sugar 40c per 1/2 peck; supply limited.  
Potatoes: Irish Cobblers No. 1 home grown 30a35c per 1/2 peck; good supply. Per bushel quality and condition good \$2.00a\$2.25. Irish Cobblers No. 2 per 1/2 peck 20a25c. Per bushel quality and condition good \$1.50a\$1.60.  
Sweet Potatoes: Supply limited and condition good 40a60c per 1/2 peck.  
Parsley: Some grown good quality and condition 3a5c per bunch.  
Rhubarb: Home grown fair supply excellent quality 5a10c per bunch.  
Radishes: Home grown good supply and condition 5a8c per bunch.  
Summer Squashes: 5a10a15c each.  
Spinach: Home grown good supply and condition 10a15c per peck.  
Tomatoes: Home grown good supply quality and condition good 10a15a20 per box; mostly 15a20a25c per 1/2 peck.  
Turnips: New supply limited 40c per 1/2 peck.

**Fruits**  
Apples: Transparents supply good home yrown 30a40c per 1/2 peck. Red Astrakhan 30a40c per 1/2 peck.  
Bananas: Supply medium good quality and condition 30a50c per doz.  
Blackberries: Home grown good supply good quality and condition 25a30c qt.  
Cantaloupes: Some soft and over ripe 1a15a20c each. Honey Dew Melons each 25a30c each.  
Gooseberries: Medium supply good quality and condition 15a18c per qt.  
Grapefruit: Supply limited quality fair 15a20c each.  
Huckleberries: Fair supply good quality and condition 35a40c quart.  
Lemons: Good supply fair quality and condition 50a80c per dozen.  
Pears: Home grown 20a30c per 1/2 peck; fair supply. California 15a20c box.  
Peaches: Georgia peaches fair supply good quality and condition 25a30c. Home grown fair supply good quality 15a20c. Fair 25a30c per 1/2 peck. \$2.00a\$2.25 per % basket; some green low as \$1.00.  
Pineapples: 20a35c each.  
Plums: California medium supply good quality 10a15c per box home grown red 10c quart.  
Watermelons: 40a75c each.  
Butter: Country 65a70c per lb. Creamery 68a72c per lb.  
Eggs: Nearby fresh 50a52c per doz. Mostly 50c.  
Poultry: Dressed \$1.25a\$1.25 each. Boilers 75a\$1.00 each. Squabs 30a50c each.

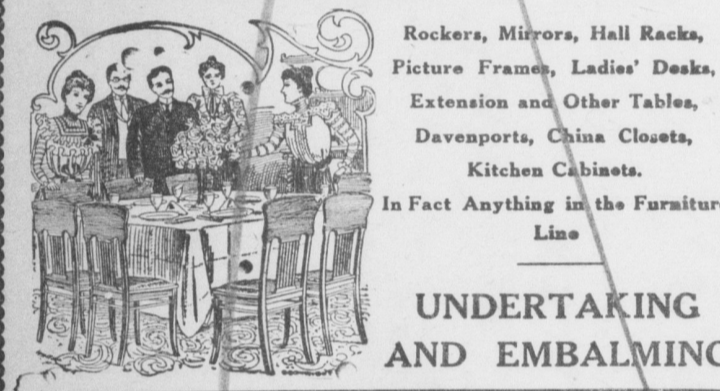
