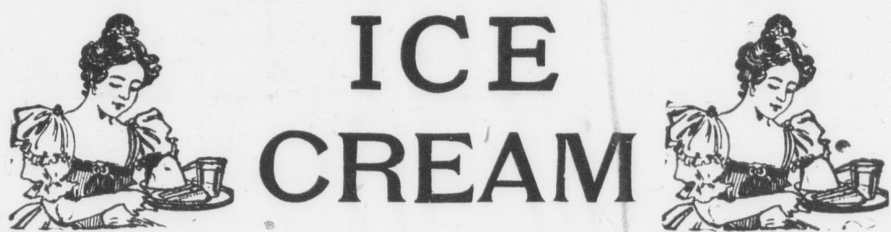

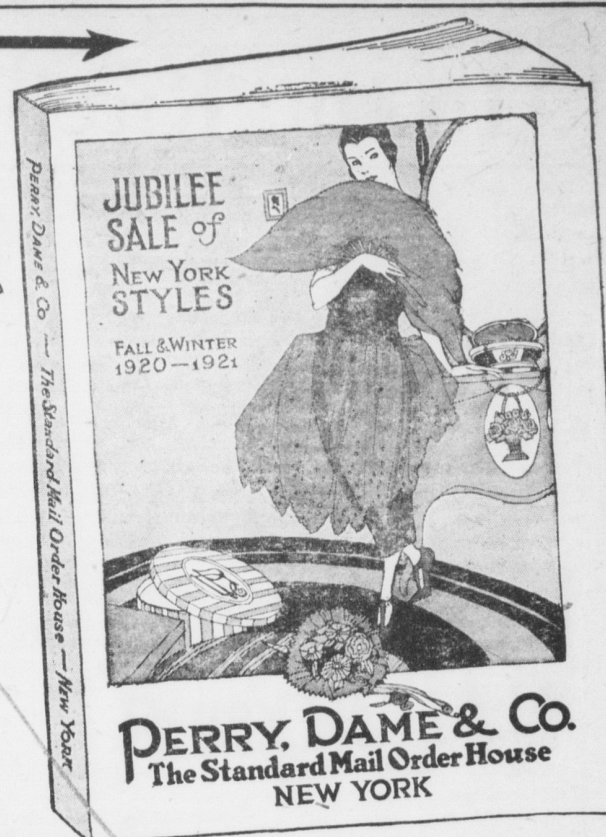
TWO PEOPLE SLIP ON SOFT SOAP INJURED
