Farmers' Day at Manheim

Manheim will observe its second annual Farmers' Day on Friday and Saturday, October 22nd and 23rd. Indications are that this will surpass last year's exhibit of farm products and farm machinery by big odds. A public meeting will be held on Friday evening in the big tent erected on Market Square for that purpose. Speakers of prominence have been engaged for this evening. Saturday afternoon a public sale for cattle and cows will follow the exhibition. The amusements will be under the guiding hand of the American Legion and the Athletic Association. Band concerts will be given Friday evening, Saturday afternoon and Saturday evening. Cash prizes and ribbons will be awarded the exhibitors. The exhibits will be classified by competent judges. Practically all of the space has now been engaged, by exhibitors. The farm products and fancy work will be arranged in a large tent sixty feet square. All roads will lead to Manheim for the Farmers' Day event.

THE PRICE IS BOUND TO TAKE FURTHER TUMBLE

There are \$330,000 tons of raw sugar in Cuba, says William A. Merchant of Havana, president of the National Bank of Cuba, and he warned growers against hoarding their production in the hope of better prices. There is no scarcity in the United States, he says, and it is the opinion of refiners that there will be a surplus here of 200,000 tons on December 31st. He adds that the best crop of the United States will probably be 200,000 tons greater than last year, and the best sugar crop of Europe is estimated at between 700,000 and 900,000 tons more than what it was in 1919.

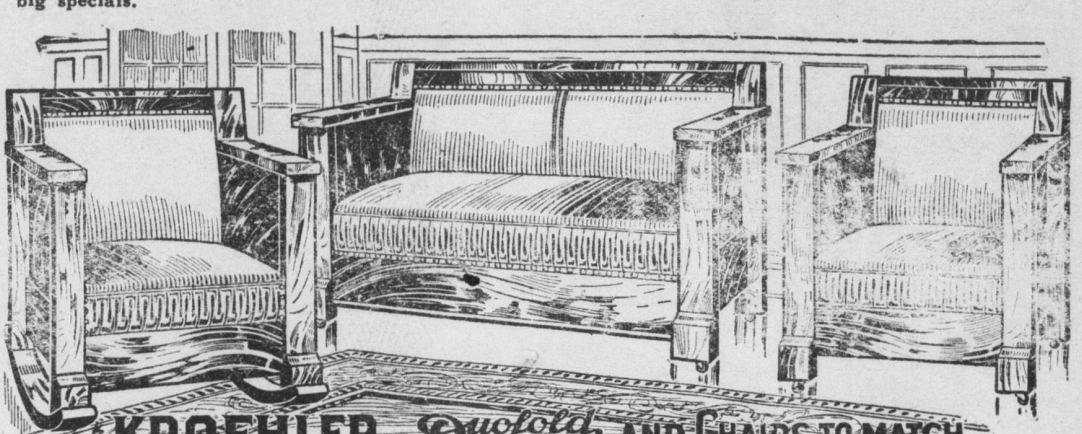
Ulrich—Fravel
