## ARE NOW IN THE SUNNY SOUTH

MR. ELAM STAUFFER, OF ROUTE NO. 2, MANHEIM, NOW IN FLORIDA, WRITES IN-TERESTING LETTER TO THE EDITOR

The many friends of Mr. Elam Stauffer, one of our rural friends, will be interested in the following written at Bradenton, Florida.

We left Lancaster, Pa., on Friday, Nov. 26 at 6:30 a. m. and landed in Washington D. C., at 10:20 A. M. where we spent 5 hours looking around the city with Enos Rohrer and his bride, on their honeymoon, whom we met on the train. Leaving Washington D. C., at 3:15 the same day we spent the remainder of that day and the night on the train and the next day at 3:15 p. m. we were at Jacksonville, Fla., where we spent the night at the Hotel Columbia and sent a few cards back.

The next morning at 10:00 a. m. we again boarded the train for Tampa. On this trip we saw our first and many oranges and grapefruit groves and very beautiful lakes. This scenery sure was welcome as the scenery thus far was nothing but waste land, razorback hogs and negro huts, but from Jacksonville to Tampa we had beautiful scenery. The country here has many lakes and ponds among them we saw Lake Alfred the most beautiful lake in Florida. We also passed one of the largest orange groves in Florida having over 200 acres in trees.

Arriving at Tampa at 5:00 p. m. on Sunday, Nov. 28 we located at Hotel Olive for the night and had the pleasant thought of having finished our train ride.

On Monday morning, Nov. 29, we set out to find a place for rent and after tramping around until noon we decided to go on to Bradenton as rooms and cottages seemed scarce and high priced but we soon found that the boat leaves only once each day and that was in the morning, so in the afternoon we visited Sulphur Springs an the alligator farm where about 1,000 alligators are kept. After which we again put up at Hotel Olive for another night.

In the morning of Nov. 30 at 8:30 we sailed from Tampa on the steamer Pokanoket for Bradenton and it may be of interest to know that this steamer and most of the trains down here burn wood instead of coal.

Some of the interesting things on the boat were feeding the gulls (Continued on page 3)

## THE FLORIN WATER CO'S NEW SCHEDULE OF RATES

As was mentioned in these columns last week the Florin Water Company filed with the Public Service Commission new rates governing water service in Mount Joy and East Donegal townships. The new rates will go into effect January 1, and the increases are from 1 to \$5, according to the kind of service rendered. The increases are as follows:

First spigot, \$8 to \$9; hydrant with screw nozzle, \$8 to \$10; paved walk only, \$6 to \$9; bath tub, \$3 to \$4; water closet, \$2.50 to \$5; wash nozzle and second spigot, \$10.50 to \$12.50; slaughter houses, \$10 to \$20; horse and cow, for first two, each, \$1 to \$1.50; horse and cow, each additional, 50 cents to \$1.

Nissley, of Guthrie, Okla., as follows: A few banks in Oklahoma, recently closed or rather were closed by the bank commissioners largely because they had too much cotton farmers paper and the market being very poor on cotton. Many of the farmers are unable to meet their obligations. Here we think times are rather precarious. Farmers are especially complaining very much. Seed cotton is 3c a pound, wheat \$1.25, corn 40c, cattle absolutely no market and hogs are almost as bad and of course the conditions have a very depressing effect on business. Merchants are selling at sacrifice prices.
