YORK COUNTIAN FOUND NEAR E'TOWN

MAN LIVED IN HARVEY KAYLOR'S BARN FOR TWO WEEKS, EATING ONLY RAW CORN AND MILK

Milk and raw corn formed the diet on which Edward Gilbert, 40 years old, lived while he hid for two weeks or longer in a barn on the farm of Harvey Kaylor, near Elizabethtown, Gilbert, who is believed to be mentally unbalanced was brought from his hiding place by state police and is being held at the county jail for examination.

Gilbert, who insists his home is in New Salem, York county, would not tell the police why he remained in hiding nor would he talk further than to state his name and residence. When the police found him he was sitting in a cache held in the large hay pile in the barn.

Kaylor, owner of the farm told the police that two weeks ago he found indications that some one was living in his barn and marked the doors to see if the person would come out to prow around at night. The marks remained intact for two weeks so Kaylor called upon the state police to solve the mystery.

Trooper Williams, of Troop E. was detailed on the case and remained on the farm several days before he located the mysterious lodger. One of the indications given Mr. Kaylor that some one lived in his barn was the disappearance at various times of small quantities of corn. Because the cows were also stabled in that building it is supposed Gilbert washed his corn lunches down with milk. He would not tell the police how he lived.

Inquiries made in York county last night failed to connect Gilbert with any family in New Salem. When found he was attired in a blue over-all suit. Alderman Doebler sentenced him to thirty days in jail for vagrancy to hold him for a mental examination after which he will probably be confined to a sanitarium.

AUTO CLUB WINS IN THREE CASES

The Lancaster Automobile Club has won three signal victories in cases that it had taken to the Public Service Commission. The club had been fighting against the Pennsylvania Railroad Company for maintaining dangerous crossings at Gingrich in East Hempfield township and in the village of Florin.

The commission on Friday handed down an order in which the railroad company is told to place a watchman at Florin between the hours of 10 P. M. and 6 A. M. This will provide watchman protection twenty-four hours each day. In reference to Gingrich's Crossing the commission orders that an audible signal be installed and that the embankment be cut down one foot from its present height on both sides of the crossing on the south side of the railroad tracks for a distance of fifty feet. This means that an automatic bell signal must be installed which will be sounded by approaching trains.

The club also has lodged a complaint against the Columbia and Washington Borough Turnpike Company for having a stretch of highway on which it collects tolls in an impassable condition. The commission ordered that the turnpike be sacrificed, reconstructed, and rolled; that the company open and clean all longitudinal and cross drains and repair or reconstruct all guard rails and fences.

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HOME-MADE CIDER LAWFUL SAYS PALMER

Use of cider in the home by its manufacturer, even after it has become intoxicating by fermentation, is lawful and without the bounds of the prohibition enforcement act, according to an opinion submitted to the secretary of the treasury by Attorney General Palmer.
The opinion is in direct conflict with the regulations of the bureau of internal revenue, which state that home-made cider must be "non-intoxicating in fact," although not necessarily containing less than one-half of one per cent of alcohol.

TESTIMONY WILL BE TAKEN AND HEARD LATER

MASONS WILL BUILD \$50,000 BOYS' HOME
