SCHOOL DISTRICTS SHORT

Lancaster county school districts are short of funds which the State appropriates semi-annually, to the

amount of \$5,000. This amount was payable on January 1, but due to a deficiency, at the State Department of Public Instruction, which is estimated to be more than \$1,000,000. the money was not forthcoming. The shortage affects 650 school teachers throughout the county There are about 300 teachers at the

Mr. Joseph Haines visited relatives \$10 rate, 100 at the \$12.50 rate and 250 at the \$20 rate, so that the amount due to the Lancaster district each year is \$10,000. Half of this money is payable in January and the other half in May. Failure of the various school dis-

COMMISSION CLAIMS MONEY WILL BE AVAILABLE TO PROMOTE AGRICULTURE IN ABOUT 30 DAYS.

Washington, D. C .- The farm loan et, designed to assist the agriculturdevelopment of the United States, y providing readily accessible credts to farmers through federal land anks was declared valid on Monday by the Supreme court.

In an opinion which Commissioner Charles E. Lobdell, of the farm loan oard, declared "clears away every egal question and removes ever shadow of question as to the legality of the banks or their bonds," the ourt held that Congress had full authority to establish the loan banks and he correlative authority to exmpt their bonds from state taxation. Commissioner Lobdell announced that there would be an immediate ssue of farm loan bonds "to an undeterminate amount" to finance the proved by the board which were held up pending the court's decision.
