**Trying To Kill Mutual Insurance**

(Continued from page 1) much lower rates than those provided by the old line companies.

However, this year considerable effort has been centered on the fight with the result that thus far there have been several public hearings before the Legislative committee having the bills in hand. Several other meetings are scheduled for the coming week. At the one on Tuesday relative to the fraternal organizations, there will be in attendance John G. Kugler, of Pottstown, who has circulated several petitions and presented them to the committee.

These bills affect directly perhaps the greatest number of citizens of any legislation at Harrisburg this term of the Legislature. Practically every household is represented in some manner either by a policy in a mutual fire insurance company or by a member of the household being a member of a fraternal beneficial organization. These two institutions are requesting that public on the bills write their representatives in Harrisburg expressing their desire that the bills be defeated.

Hon. C. R. Lantz, president of the Pennsylvania State Association of Mutual Fire Insurance Companies states that under the new bills, every mutual fire insurance company would be obliged to go out of business eventually as they would hardly be able to comply with the conditions.

The mutual companies take as the basis of their contentions the report of the Superintendent of Insurance of the District of Columbia, which states as follows:

"Stock fire insurance is a profit-making business for the purpose of selling indemnity. Its primary interest is in its profits; it is organized to secure them and uses every means at its disposal to further that end. The inevitable result is an opposition of interest between the management and stockholders on one hand and the policyholders and public on the other. Mutual fire insurance, in distinction, is insurance in its purest form. It is a pooling of risks by the individuals who own them. There is no division of interest, the enterprise is not undertaken for profit but simply for the protection of those concerned. The chief purpose of the mutual fire insurance business is maximum protection at a minimum cost. It is interested in eliminating every item of expense which does not contribute directly to furnishing the
