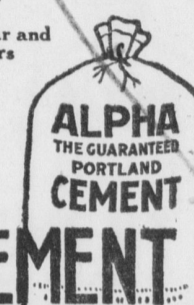

LANCASTER MAY REGAIN NINTH REVENUE DISTRICT

The news comes from Washington that Secretary of the Treasury Mellon recommends Congress to create ten new revenue districts. It is interesting news for Lancaster, as it is considered certain that the old Ninth District, which a couple of years ago was annexed to the First District (Philadelphia) will be recreated. It was abolished in order to give Delaware a district of its own. It is believed that will still continue. The old Ninth consisted of fifteen Pennsylvania counties, including the State's principal tobacco growing counties, Lancaster and York.

USE OF BEER FORBIDDEN FOR MEDICINAL PURPOSES

Washington, D. C.—The House Judiciary committee agreed today to report out the Volstead bill which would prohibit sale of beer on physician's prescription for use by the sick. As approved, the bill also would make the Volstead enforcement act apply to Hawaii and the Virgin Islands, but not to the Philippines. Other provisions accepted, included a tightening up clause to prohibit importation of liquors until the present stock held under government supervision has been exhausted.

DIES OF CHLOROFORM INTENDED FOR AGED PET CAT

Frank Souders, a Pennsylvania Railroad engineer, lost his life attempting to chloroform an aged pet cat at his home in Paoli while his family was away. The cat scratched and struggled as he tried to hold a chloroform rag to its nose. Souders fell unconscious and died from the fumes. The cat ran away.


Water Committee

The bill of the Columbia Telephone Company was referred to the Burgess and the balance of the bills amounting to \$2,273.45 were then paid after which Council adjourned.




