DONEGAL REUNION WELL ATTENDED

upon it would be inscribed the completed record, in brief, of the church up to the present time. He also urged the holding of a fitting historical pageant at Donegal, in connection with one of the annual reunions in the near future.

Officers Elected
Other officers chosen were: vice-presidents, Miss Arabella W. Redsecker, Columbia; Dr. James P. Ziegler, Mount Joy; E. Burd Zell, Chester; Benjamin F. Hoffman, Bainbridge; and B. Frank Hiestand, Marietta; recording secretary, Miss Rebecca J. Slaymaker, Lancaster; corresponding secretary, Bernard J. Myers, Lancaster, assistant secretary, John L. Summy, Marietta, treasurer; Samuel R. Slaymaker, Lancaster.

Executive Committee
The executive committee selected consists of the following: Clarence Schock, Mt. Joy; Miss Virginia B. Clark, Lancaster; Miss Bertha Heisey, Rheems; the Rev. George Israel Browne, Washington, Conn.; the Rev. G. Wells Ely, Columbia; Mrs. S. R. Slaymaker, Lancaster, and Miss Lillian Evans, Columbia.

Mark Soldier's Graves
The services of marking the graves of the dozen known soldiers of the Revolution, ten in the Donegal churchyard and two in the Maytown churchyard, were very impressive. Brief addresses were made by Mrs. J. G. Forney, Lancaster, and Miss Lillian Evans, Columbia, and Miss Josephine Buchanan, Marietta, representing the Donegal and the Witness Tree chapters and the higher bodies of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

The speech of the event was delivered by Col. David B. Case, of Marietta, who deplored the fact that no battlefields of the Revolutionary War have been made national cemeteries. He said every American should at some time visit Valley Forge, the great Revolutionary encampment site. He paid high tribute to the D. A. R. for their patriotic inspiration.

At this service Rev. Robert Taylor, pastor of the Derry church, near Hershey, made a plea for assistance in taking steps to preserve the Derry churchyard in Dauphin county, saying hundreds of dollars are needed to get this historic place into good condition.

A fine tribute was paid by Attorney F. Lyman Windolph, at the memorial service, to Miss Martha B. Clark. A bronze tablet measuring eight by eighteen inches, recalls her devotion to Donegal.

Tribute to Soldiers
Tribute to the Keystone State's accomplishments in the struggle for independence was paid by Hon. Emerson Collins, of Williamsport, in his address "Pennsylvania in the Revolution." He pointed out that the deeds of many of the sons of this State have been unused, though they are beginning to come into their own. A decided step in this direction was made through the late Hon. W. U. Hensel, he said. That Lancaster county patriots had a prominent part in the fighting he declared was illustrated by such names as Henry and Steele, noted for endurance and prowess.

Bernard J. Myers spoke briefly, urging a keener appreciation of the heritage we are enjoying today. He referred to the fact that soldiers of every great war in which America was engaged are today buried in the Donegal cemetery.

The musical program furnished by Miss Emma A. Wakefield, of Columbia; Miss Marguerite E. Herr, of Lancaster; Thompson S. Martin, of Harrisburg; Mrs. Alta Booth Cowan, of Lancaster; Mrs. John S. Simon, of Maytown, and W. Clyde Shisler, of Lancaster, was an enjoyable feature.

Rev. Dr. James G. Rose, of Mercersburg, a son of Donegal, his ancestry hailing from that historic valley in part, was the orator of the evening. His subject was "The Primitive Pennsylvania Presbyterians." His discourse formed a fitting close to the celebration.

He pointed out that Pennsylvania's Presbyterians were much in evidence in Colonial days and that the Quakers were disturbed by their presence in the province in those times, because of the difference in beliefs between the frontier fighters and the non-resisting followers of Penn. He recalled their splendid formative influence upon our institutions.

A BASKET WEAVER IS HELD FOR COURT
Following a hearing before Squire C. C. Hicks, last evening George Einsig, of East Donegal township, was held for court on charges of receiving stolen goods and resisting an officer. He furnished bail for his appearance in court.

Harry Newcomer, of Maytown, is the prosecutor in the charge of receiving stolen goods. State Trooper A. R. Fox, of Troop E, preferred the charge of resisting an officer.

According to the testimony of Newcomer and his son Ralph a cornet, \$5 in cash, 15 pounds of cheese, four dozens of eggs, a shirt, ladies skirts and two aprons were stolen. The only goods found at the Einsig home near Marietta when a search was made by Trooper Fox was a cornet. The accused refuses to say anything about the charge against him.

The charge of resisting an officer grows out of an alleged attack on Trooper Fox when he went to the Einsig home with a search warrant.

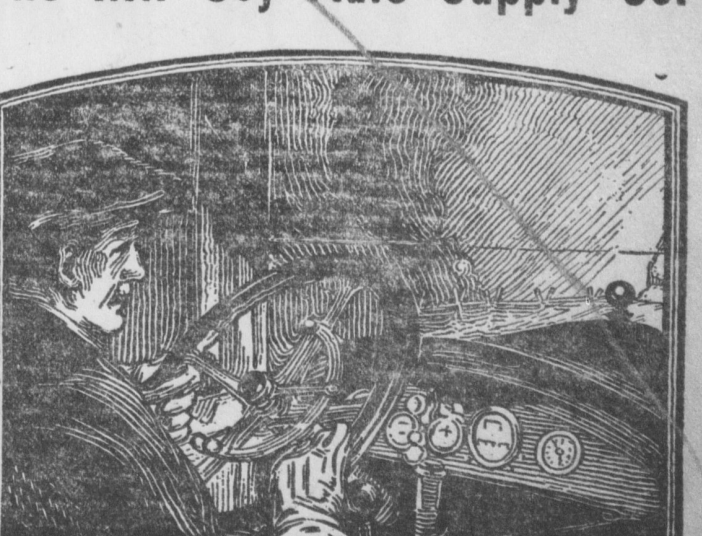
