MOTORISTS IN DEATH VALLEY

Section Which for So Long Has Been Known as a Trackless Desert Now Scenic Spot. Death valley, the terror of the desert and the country many believe that God not only forgot but never heard of, has been tamed and made safe for motorists as a scenic spot which seriously rivals Yellowstone National park for beauty.

Death valley, scintillating in the sun, will lure motorists of today as it lured weary prospectors of old, but its sting has been removed. No longer will the parched traveler seek in vain for the water hole he cannot find or for the trail he has lost in the mesquite.

A message which turns upside down the popular and nationwide opinion of this fabled valley, which has incubated the fame of "Borax" Smith and "Death Valley" Scotty, is being sent to the world by the touring bureau of America's largest motoring organization, the Automobile Club of Southern California, for the purpose of removing the curse of the malignant rumors, which it says are unfounded.

Already the first steps have been taken. The Southern California Automobile club has erected 1,230 metal road signs to make Death valley fool-proof to the motoring visitor. This is the largest number of road signs ever erected for a similar purpose.

Contrary to what might be expected, this does not remove the romance of the desert, but the story brought out of Death valley by members of the crew who erected the signposts puts an available romance into the spot which can be plumed by every automobile owner in the United States.—Philadelphia Ledger.

Radiophone Music. It appears very much as though we are on the verge of a new era in radio communication, namely, the use of phone music for the home. The idea, in brief, says the Scientific American, is to have radiophone stations at central points sending out concert music as well as speeches and lectures via radio, and compact and simple radio receiving sets in various homes, clubs and so on to intercept the waves. Already there are several radiophone stations in operation, and at least one wireless company has developed a receiving set made in the form of a cabinet phonograph incorporating a concealed long-speaking telephone unit, so that the music, speech, lecture or other radiophone transmission can be heard throughout a room. It is believed by radio men that leading manufacturers of radio equipment will see fit to maintain radiophone concert and lecture service for their patrons.

Levied on Skunk for Fur. A most amusing and unexpected bit of evidence as to the resourcefulness of wild animals was seen by a Fort Collins, Colo., man who had a pet skunk and a squirrel caged together. The two animals are firm friends, but when the squirrel wanted material to build a nest it proceeded to chew through the fur of the skunk's back. Now the innocent skunk has a bald spot as big as a saucer, and the squirrel has a nest made, partially at least, of skunk fur.

Rooster Hatched Out Family. In the poultry yard of a Pennsylvania man is a bantam rooster which is caring for four little chicks it hatched out recently. About eight weeks ago the family missed the crowing of the bantam rooster, which usually began at 4 a. m. and continued for an hour or more. It was found sitting on the nest, clucking like a hen. All efforts to make him leave the nest failed. Seven eggs were put under him, four of which hatched.

Another Dinosaur Discovered. Another dinosaur has been discovered in Alberta. This latter "find" is of an entirely new species, and according to Dr. W. A. Parkes, professor of geology at the University of Toronto, it is the only one of its kind ever discovered. The bones of this new dinosaur, extinct many thousands of years ago, were discovered by a party which explored Alberta under Prof. Parkes' instructions.

BRAIN MATERIAL TO SPARE
