## THE STATE POLICE HEAR HER STORY

### MISS LILLIAN BENDER, OF SPORTING HILL, MAKES STARTLING ADMISIONS AT THE BAR-RACKS AT LANCASTER

Starting facts were brought to light in statements given the State Police by thirteen-year-old Lillian Bender of Sporting Hill whose admissions have caused the arrest of her mother, Mrs. Jane Bender, and two males. Further developments of a more serious nature are expected within the next week. According to the girl's confessions she was at all times at the mercy of the males who have been arrested. She says no attempt ever was made to protect her from their attacks. According to the police the girl is suffering from dementia. Her hair has been cut short. She does not, however, seem to realize the seriousness of the exact condition under which she lived. No charge has yet been brought against her mother for her failure to protect the girl but the parent has been held on another charge brought about by her own actions.

Two inhabitants of Sporting Hill, are held on charges which were made by the girl. One has been heard and held for court and the other will be heard tonight before Squire Danner at Manheim. The males are Amos Wolf, who will be heard tonight and John F. Conner. The investigation which brought to light the illegal unspeakable conditions at Sporting Hill was made by Troopers Goucher and Pine of Troop E. State Police, who still are working on the case.

## BODY OF LAWN SOLDIER ARRIVES FROM FRANCE

Harry B. Gingrich, of Lawn, Thursday received telegraphic information to the effect that the body of his son, Private Walter Gingrich, aged 21 years, is at the port of Hoboken, having arrived from abroad with the shipment of American soldier dead. The laws of Pennsylvania forbid the killing of the red breasted robin. This law will be enforced even though the Federal Government does issue permits for killing same, between May 16 and July 15th, which is nesting season. The action of the States Game Commission is that the game code does not give authority to kill robins and that in any event the commissioners deem it wrong to issue permits to kill birds during the nesting season.

## ANOTHER POULTRY CULLING DEMONSTRATION AUG. 4

The signal results that followed the holding of twenty-four poultry culling demonstrations in various sections of the county last summer by the Lancaster County Farm Bureau, in connection with the Poultry Extension Department of State College, has led to the announcement this week that a series of nine culling demonstrations would take place in the county next week during the days of Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, August 2, 3 and 4.

The demonstrations will be in charge of County Agent F. S. Bucher with Prof. Paul R. Guldin, of State College, showing the practical advantages of culling and how it may be done. Poultry-culling, once thought mere theory, has proved of untold value to the poultryman who makes it a business and to the farmer who keeps poultry merely as a sideline. With this in mind, posters have been placed everywhere over the county the past few days with the significant query: "Do you keep poultry, or does your poultry keep you?" Those who not only followed the meetings, but followed the advice as well, have repeatedly reported to the Farm Bureau their astonishment at the remarkable results obtained, and there are as a consequence many persons who are able to detect and call the "star boarder" with unerring judgment.
