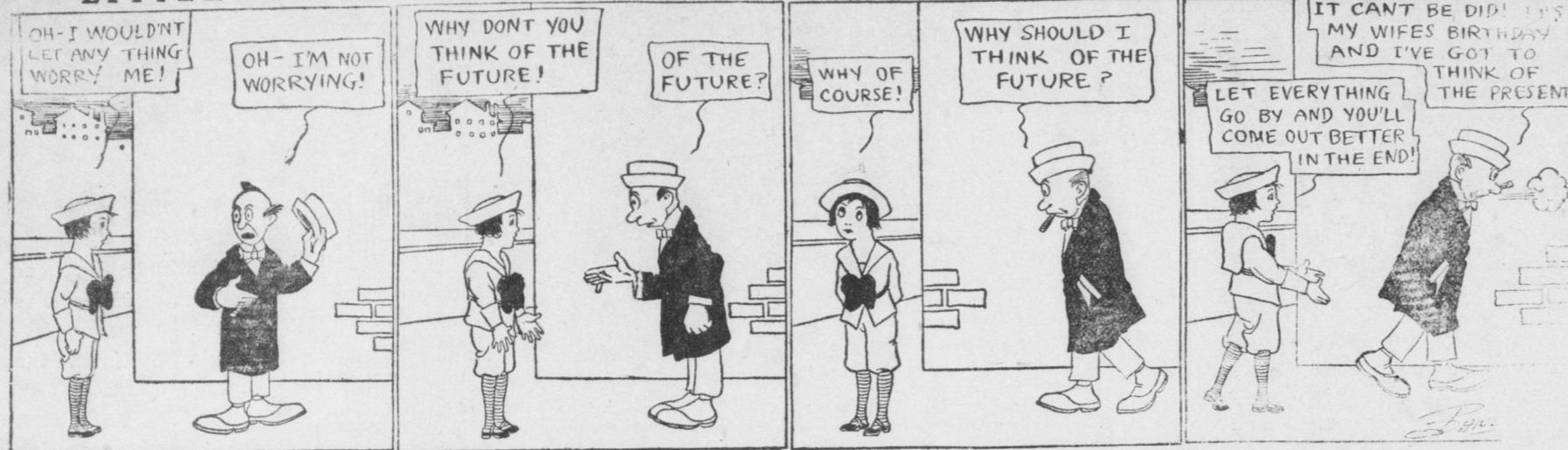
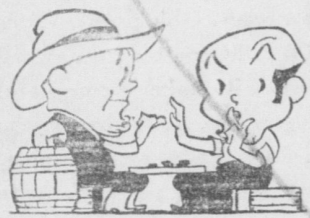

Mr. Ruhl is survived by his wife and the following children: Homer, Anna, Jacob and Ada. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Reuben F. Ruhl and one brother Monroe, of Manheim also survive. The funeral services will be held Friday at 1:30 o'clock at the home and at 2 o'clock in the Mt. Hope church. Interment will be made in the Fairview cemetery.

William D. Swords William D. Swords, one of the best known residents of this place, died very suddenly at his home on East Main street Saturday morning after a very brief illness. He was up town Friday evening and seemed to be in his usual good health. Deceased was in his 78th year and was a veteran of the Civil War.
