PARCELS MAY BE INSURED SINCE APRIL 1

Beginning April 1st, the Pennsylvania Railroad will accord its patrons the privilege of insuring, to the extent of \$300.00, all parcels, values or packages left at the station parcel rooms to be called for, at the nominal rate of ten cents for each \$100.00 over the railroad's present liability of \$22.00. Articles exceeding \$300.00 in value will not be accepted. Persons desiring to avail themselves of this additional insurance will be required to sign a blank on which the value must be shown, and excess value stamps, equivalent to the amount collected, will be affixed by the agent to the back of the duplicate check, which will serve as the owner's receipt.

This new arrangement will not in any way affect or change the present system of charges for the temporary storage of parcels, which is on the basis of ten cents for each 24 hours, or fraction, with a minimum charge of \$1.00 per month.

THE MOUNT JOY SCHOOL BOARD MET ON MONDAY

The Mount Joy Borough School Board met in regular session on Monday evening with Dr. E. W. Newcomer, Dr. W. D. Chandler and Joseph T. M. Breneman present and Dr. A. F. Snyder and Mr. Thos. J. Brown absent. Orders for the payment of bills and salaries were passed.

The tax rate for the present year was discussed but no definite conclusion reached. The state delinquents at Harrisburg, so far as they are related to the school appropriation, were discussed at length. Eshleman's attention to the Board was called to the report in circulation that the Borough schools would have to close about the first of April. There is no foundation for such a report and the schools will continue their full term and close the last of May.
