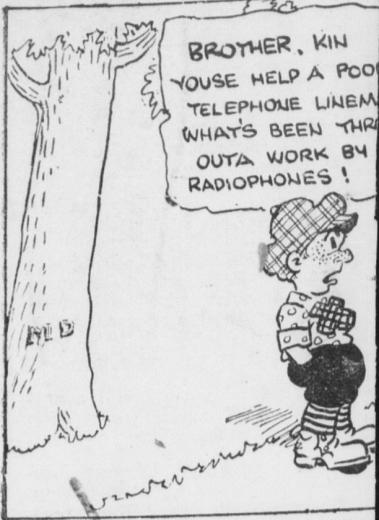

HOW LITTLE ABOUT AMERICA

Traveler Tells of Odd Beliefs That Are Prevalent Among Even Well-Educated Europeans.

Austin Stack, minister of home affairs in the former cabinet of Eamon DeValera, tells of some of the curious opinions regarding life in the United States still prevailing among Europeans.

HAD HEARD IT ALL BEFORE

Mr. Pester's Pessimism Interrupted by Memories of His Grandfather's Remarks Concerning Time's Trend.

"This boasted progress of ours is mere illusion," grimly said old Festus Pester. "Corruption permeates our entire social fabric. Selfishness has supplanted generosity. The process of disintegration is going on at an alarming rate."

"In fact, I would mention that a crisis is at hand, and also that it is a pretty kettle of fish, if I did not recall that my venerable grandfather held practically the same opinion of the world and his fellow men at his stage of the game and there are still in existence letters written by his grandfather wherein is set forth a like estimate of the folks and affairs of his day, and there is a tradition to the effect that his ancestors felt the same way about their own times and associates."

KNOW MUCH OF SANITATION

Explorer Points Out Error in Classing People of Old Times as Absolutely Barbarian.

During a protracted stay in Arabia and other parts of the Near East, Col. W. G. Archer of Evansville, Ind., master plumber and field agent of the National Association of Master Plumbers, made a study of ancient sanitation equipment. He returned to the United States only a few months ago and was in this city recently, says a San Antonio correspondent.

"We-prate of our great civilization and we discount the ancients, because we know next to nothing of their methods or their customs," Colonel Archer said. "I found bathtubs made of stone in Babylon and evidence of tubs made of metal and various other kinds of stone. They are identical with those of to-day, with the same openings for letting water in and for letting it out. The Babylonians had sanitation, plumbing and bath facilities practically as we have them to-day."

"I know a number of Englishmen who are 'digging' in the ruins of the island of Crete, and I recently received pictures of vitrified bathtubs and toilet fixtures that they have unearthed there."

Traces of Old Civilization

Five miles from Dartford, England, on the old Dover road, the modern road-makers are making great discoveries. Just ahead of them is a Roman camp. Under their feet are traces of Celtic, even earlier, civilization.

The biggest find so far has been the skeleton of a woman, six feet three inches in height, crouched with hands clasped in a praying attitude. Clearly not a Roman burial, for the pose is Celtic and there was no trace of a coffin. The skeleton lay where the body was placed, in a hole cut in the solid chalk.

The road-makers are keeping careful watch for one of these. Already they have accumulated portions of a Roman tessellated pavement some characteristic ornaments of the period, and other signs that the area covered by the camp is being approached.

Many Visit Forests

Value of the national forests for recreation is increasing by leaps and bounds. Six million people visit the forests annually to camp, fish, hunt, hike, motor or rest, from all parts of the United States, says the American Forestry Magazine. Recreational use of these forests represents possibly less than 1 per cent of their total potential use. The rapid increase in the number of people deriving pleasure from the forests is due in large part to their recreational development by the forest service. Over a thousand campsites have been set apart and posted, and recreational permits have been issued for over 6,000 summer homes, cabins, hotels and club houses.

Sure He Will Find Treasure

An Irish farmer risked his all on a field of two acres near Mullinger which, in the ordinary way, would have brought about \$200. After brief bidding he paid \$2,000 for it. The farmer who has become the new owner expended his life's savings on its acquisition. He declares his intention of digging over the whole acreage in search of treasure. Some time ago a box was dug up in the field, and was found to contain some Spanish gold coins and a map, believed to indicate the hiding place of more treasure in the field.

SOME CLEVER LINEN FROCKS

Fabric Featured in Garments for Young Girls; Chambray Also Interesting Material.

Linen are featured in frocks for children and young girls. One designed for a girl of twelve or fourteen years, is especially charming because of its color combination and interesting trimming. The dress was shown in a light, dull green piped in henna, and the blocks of embroidery on sleeves and skirt, both back and front, were done in several shades of green, dull red, yellow, and touches of black also appearing.

The dress is a perfectly straight smock-like affair, and could be made by any home dressmaker. Any garments that are handmade or hand-embroidered must of necessity be expensive if bought ready-to-wear. The woman who is skillful with her needle is fortunate when handmade and hand-embroidered garments are the vogue, because simplicity is almost always the dominant note in the designing of these garments, so that time and patience are her major requirements with a handsome and exclusive wardrobe as her reward.

Another little tailored linen frock, featured a straight front and back panel with little strap belts at either side, holding the dress in a trifle and giving a slight side flare below the waistline. Plain, heavy linen in a dull blue was used for the frock, with pipings in rose. Blocks of embroidery on skirt and sleeves were multi-colored. The dress was a slipover, but the slight opening was at the back instead of the side front.

Brown chambray fashioned another dainty little frock, cuffs, collar and pockets were of white organdie embroidered in brown and red wool yarn. The pockets were criss-crossed all over, while a mere line of embroidery finished collar and cuffs.

SIMPLE LINES FOR DRESSES

Little Frock That Features Smocking at the Waist and Yoke Appeals to All.

The youthful frock, developed of lines of simplicity, gives marked prominence to novelty fabrics as a rule. Both novel and wearable materials—those that will appeal to "mother" from the standpoint of wearability and to the child on account of their attractiveness—are seen in a simple little frock that features smocking at the waist and yoke from which the fullness of the dress is derived.

One New York firm has had particular success with imported voile this season, voile so sheer and silky as to closely ally it with georgette. Bright colorings, such as orange, rose and green, are among the favored shades while pale yellow and white assume a hand-made appearance with their tuckings and frillings to embellish the skirt, neck and sleeves.

Marvel silk, one of the pongee family, though with more advantages in the way of being immune to water spots, has found a ready market. It is stated to be very comfortable for the afternoons in the little smock-like effect done with bright silk floss stitching. In a natural coloring or dyed shades a choice can be made.

For ready turnover, the frock of ratine has proved particularly successful. Printed in large block designs of gingham colorings, circular lines rather than fullness, are well suited to this dress, on account of the weight of the fabric. Another little style much in favor, is a tissue gingham, material of gingham simulation, but not of finer weave.

Hat Trimmings

Wool embroidery continues to be the vogue. A black hat of rather large brim was decorated with a life-size parrot in gay colors. It was embroidered on the left side of the crown. It partly decorated both crown and brim. Just simple tassels are seen on many sport hats. A tassel of white wool is allowed to fall off the left side of the brim of a bright red or green straw. White wool grapes decorate silk or straw hats of the flat, blousy tan style.

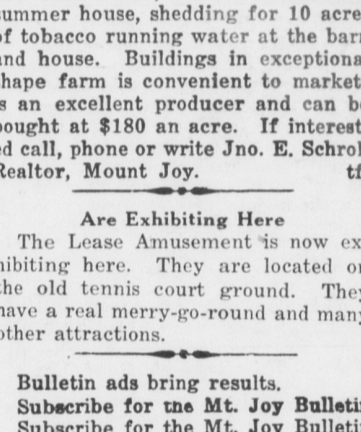
