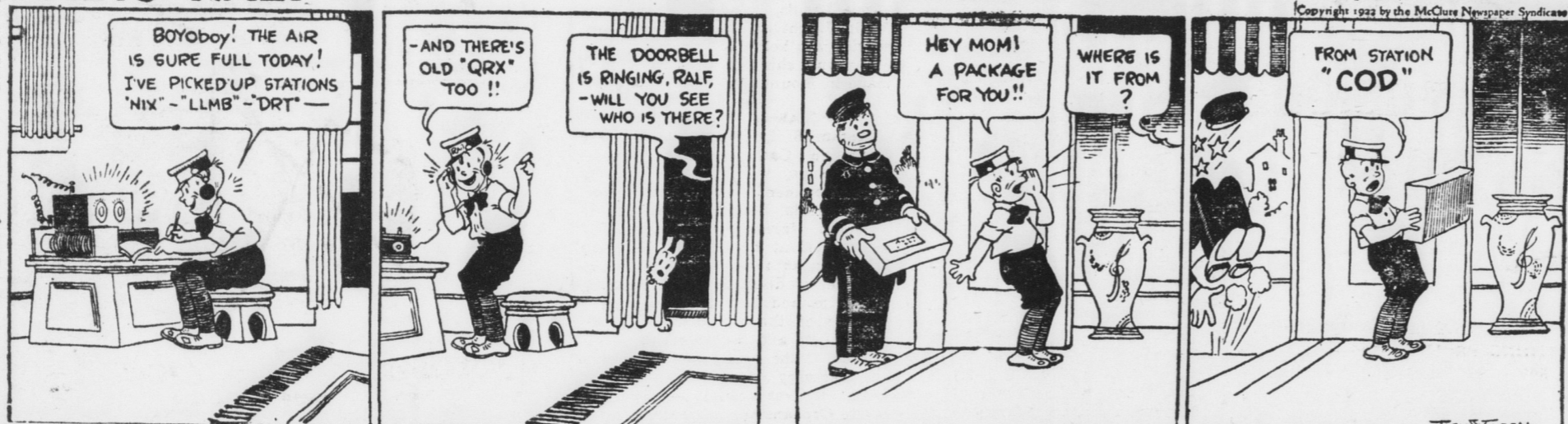

The corn earworm has been infesting beans used for cannery purposes near Baltimore, Md., and has been investigated by the United States Department of Agriculture. The actual damage to the infested fields is not apparently great, but as a factor of material importance to bean growers and canners of that section is the fact that the "worms" enter the pods, where some of them remain. Eventually they find their way into canned beans, even under the most careful handling, thus damaging the reputation of the cannery from which the jobber or wholesaler buys his stock.

15 CHAUFFEURS ARRESTED AND 30 TAXICABS RUINED

Fifteen chauffeurs are under arrest as a result of the attempt of police to break up the taxicab war between three rival companies for the cabaret trade of the Hotel Lorraine at Philadelphia.

The "taxi war" which started Wednesday morning, made the street a veritable battleground, on which taxicab drivers butted, smashed and otherwise fought their way through the ranks of rival machines, while thousands of spectators applauded. Thirty of the 48 cabs damaged were put entirely out of commission.

FIRST LOCOMOTIVE RAN 93 YEARS AGO YESTERDAY

Yesterday was the 93rd anniversary of the running of the Stourbridge Lion, the first locomotive to turn a wheel by steam in America. This historical event took place in Honesdale, over the Delaware and Hudson tracks. No recognition of the event will be made at Honesdale, but next year, in the spring of 1923, the 100th anniversary of the incorporation of the Delaware and Hudson Canal Company which has been changed to the Delaware and Hudson Railroad Company, will be celebrated. Another feature of next year's celebration will be the unveiling of a tablet or monument in commemoration of the initial trip of the Stourbridge Lion on August 8, 1829, in Honesdale, Pa.

One hundred and thirty-six thousand and four hundred and forty-one boys and girls were enrolled in agricultural extension clubs in 1921 for training in various phases of livestock work. These young farmers owned, last year, 76,147 head of farm animals and 554,288 fowls, representing a total value of \$3,605,176.
