J. W. ESHELMAN CLAIMS AGREEMENT TO BUY INTEREST Judges Landis and Hassler, sitting in Equity Court today, heard the case of John W. Eshelman, of this place, against the Grey Iron Casting Company, for the right to buy a fourth of the shares of that corporation. Only two more cases remain for disposition after this case is completed. Eshelman claimed that he had a verbal agreement with the officers of the Grey Iron Casting Company who resided in New York City, to buy one quarter interest in the concern for \$6,250, and that the firm reserved the right to buy back the stock at the value it had attained when they purchased it. He then stated that when the agreement was reduced to writing some time later the company changed the clause to read that the corporation should have the right to buy back the stock at its par value and that he refused to sign it. This occurred in 1914 and since that time until 1920 Mr. Eshelman admits that he did not bring up the matter again until he was dismissed from the company's services. He now seeks to hold the corporation to what he states was agreed upon verbally between himself and the officers of the company concerning the transfer of a quarter interest to him for \$6,250. The defense opened its case in the latter part of yesterday morning's session.
