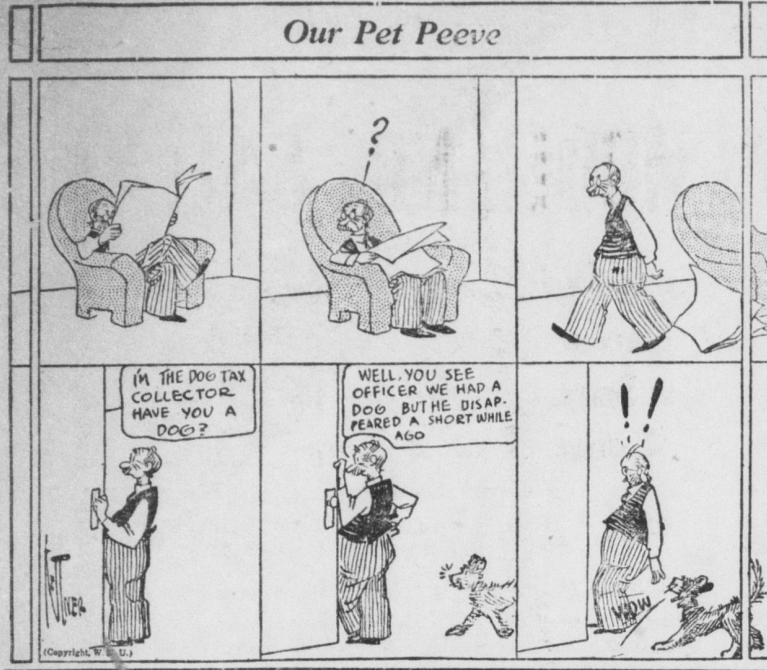

Hubbard Hall is one of the beautiful buildings of the Clarke School for the Deaf, at Northampton, Mass. It was named in honor of Gardiner G. Hubbard, father of Mrs. Alexander Graham Bell.

Under the chairmanship of the Hon. Calvin Coolidge, Vice President of the United States, the committee which is raising an endowment fund of \$500,000 for the Clarke School for the Deaf at Northampton, Mass., will devote \$100,000 for a memorial to the late Alexander Graham Bell, who was a teacher at that institution when he invented the telephone.

Dr. Bell came to this school as an instructor in 1872—four years before he invented the telephone. He served as a trustee and as President of the Board of Corporators after discontinuing his duties as an instructor. It was here that Dr. Bell first met Mabel Hubbard, who afterward became his wife. He often said that Mrs. Bell deserved much of the credit for the invention of the telephone, because of her unshaken faith and belief in his ultimate success.

This Memorial fund of \$100,000 will be devoted to carrying out some of the ideas of Dr. Bell in the work of teaching the deaf through lip reading and instruction in the use of the voice.

TELEPHONES ARE BECOMING VERY POPULAR IN CONSTANTINOPLE. The people of Constantinople, the capital of Turkey, are turning more and more each day to the telephone as the logical means of communication.

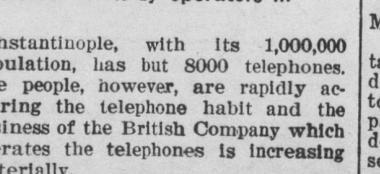
