NEW MOTOR LAWS ARE SOME PUZZLE

THE AMENDATORY LEGISLATION WILL HAVE TO BE STUDIED CAREFULLY TO INSURE FAMILIARITY

Dealers in and operators of motor vehicles will have until January 1, 1924 and March 1, 1924, to familiarize themselves with some of the several different amendatory automobile laws enacted by the 1923 session of the legislature, Benjamin G. Eynon, registrar of the automobile division, State Department of Highways, pointed out today.

Mr. Eynon, however, called attention to the fact that after November 24, owners of motor vehicles must have a certificate of title as provided under the Metcalf bill. It will not be possible to obtain 1924 license tags until a certificate of title for the vehicle has been filed with the department.

The act which makes provision for issuance of registration bulletins to such police departments as are deemed necessary, the disposal of one official copy after competitive bidding and for the recording of licenses and money by counties becomes effective as soon as the titling law is operative.

The following resume of legislation effective January 1, has been made by Mr. Eynon.

DR. C. H. WITMER, COUNTY MEDICAL INSPECTOR NAMES MEN FOR WORK THROUGHOUT COUNTY

Dr. C. H. Witmer, County Medical Director, has been notified by the State Secretary of Health, Dr. Charles H. Miner, that the following County Physicians have been appointed as official Deputies to revaccinate free of charge, school children who have undergone two or more unsuccessful attempts against smallpox. The appointees are:

Dr. J. D. Hershey, Manheim; Dr. Asher Snyder, Mt. Joy; Dr. C. E. Helm, Quarryville; Dr. J. E. Hostetter, Gap, Pa., R. D. No. 1. School children living in the rural districts who have been twice vaccinated successfully, or those who had been admitted to school last terms on an official temporary certificate must be revaccinated by the County Medical Director, or one of these official Deputies, who will grant the temporary certificate which will admit them to school for the current school year. WALTER WELFLEY'S AUTO IS DESTROYED

RAN DOWN OVER AN EMBANKMENT NEAR LANCASTER—SEVERAL OCCUPANTS HURT

The following article appeared in Saturday's News Journal: An automobile was wrecked and burned, and two young women from this city were badly injured at the forked road on the hill several hundred feet beyond the New Danville pike bridge at one o'clock Saturday morning.

The injured are Miss Ella McClune, age 18, of 201 Grofftown Road, who is a patient at the St. Joseph's Hospital with a fractured pelvic bone and internal injuries, and Miss Catharine Heidig, age 18, of 120 Cornard street, who is also being treated at the hospital with a painful flesh wound on the leg.

After vainly lying on the bank for the promised aid of other members of the automobile party, who walked into town, until after five o'clock that morning, the two injured girls were aided by another woman who passed the spot on her way into work and who supported the two girls, one on each side, on a painful walk into Engleside.

There a taxi cab was called. The girls asked to be taken to their homes but the driver insisted on hastening them to the hospital where their injuries could be treated.

Police Investigate

The affair was reported to the police and Sergeant Gainer was assigned to investigate the case. Going to the scene of the accident with the taxi cab driver, the officer obtained the license number from the dealer's plate on the burned machine.

The taxicab read Pennsylvania license No. X13-825. The records later showed that this license had been issued to W. F. Welfley of Florin.

JOHN G. REIST DIED VERY SUDDENLY AT BALTIMORE

This community was greatly shocked yesterday to learn of the very sudden and unexpected death of our well known townsman John G. Reist. He died while on a business trip to Baltimore.

He made the trip to that city Monday by auto in company with Mr. J. Clarence Reist. At dinner at the Southern hotel, he complained of not feeling well and suggested lying down. He died after which a physician was summoned and found a high blood pressure. That evening the physician suggested he had better remain and return home by train next day.

Before leaving for home that evening Clarence Reist called on him and he felt much better. At nine o'clock that evening the physician saw him and he was greatly improved. Next morning when Dr. Martingale called he found him dead, death having occurred several hours previous.

Undertaker Roy B. Sheetz went to Baltimore yesterday to bring the remains home.

Deceased was 66 years old and an active member of the Lancaster Co. Tobacco Growers' Association. He was a ruling elder and clerk of the sessions of the Presbyterian church for about twenty years. He served several terms as a Councilman from the West Ward.

Besides his wife he leaves three children: Florence, of Wooten, Ky.; Esther, at home and John, of Rochester, N. Y. Also these brothers and sisters: Eli G., of Newtown; Mary, wife of S. S. Kraybill, of Rhemes; Emma, wife of H. N. Hostetter, of near town; H. G. Reist, of Schenectady N. Y.; Anna, wife of the late Amos F. Eby, of this place.

Up to the time of our going to press the funeral arrangements had not been completed.

A PUBLIC MEMORIAL SERVICE WILL BE HELD IN ST. LUKE'S CHURCH HERE ON FRIDAY AFTERNOON.

By proclamation of President Coolidge, Friday, August 10th is to be observed as day of national mourning for the passing of the late President, Warren G. Harding, whose mortal remains are to be interred at Marion, O., on that day.

A public memorial service will be held in St. Luke's Episcopal church on Friday, August 10th, to which the inhabitants of the town and vicinity are cordially invited.

The following Civil and Military authorities and Fraternal organizations have signified their intention to be present: Borough Council, School Board, American Legion, G. A. R., Sons of Veterans, and the local lodges of Free Masons, Odd Fellows, Red Men, Knights of Malta, Patriotic Sons of America and the Foresters of America.

During the service President Harding's favorite Psalm will be recited and his favorite hymn will be sung. The above services will begin at 4 o'clock.
