AMENDATORY LEGISLA TION WILL HAVE TO BE STU-DIED CAREFULLY TO IN-SURE FAMILIARITY

Dealers in and operators of motor vehicles will have until January 1, ize themselves with some of the several different amendatory automobile laws enacted by the 1923 session of the legislature, Benjamin G. Eyways, pointed out today.

Mr. Eynon, however, called attention to the fact that after November 24, owners of motor vehicles must have a certificate of title as provided under the Metcalf bill. It will not be possible to obtain 1924 license tags until a certificate of title for the vehicle has been filed with the department.

The act which makes provision for issuance of registration bu'letins to such police departments as are deemed necessary, the disposal of one official copy after competitive bidding and for the recording of licenses and money by counties becomes effective as soon as the titling law is operative.
