## BORO COUNCIL MET IN REGULAR SESSION

(Continued from page 1.)  
to place a step over the gutter in front of his store on East Main street. There is an ordinance prohibiting obstructions of this kind. Supervisor Smeltzer was ordered to finish oiling Donegal Springs street from the residence of Henry Shelly west to the boro limits. Mr. Garber objected to placards being placed on poles and trees thru-out the boro when we have an ordinance prohibiting it. The Burgess will be asked to enforce it. Mr. Garber suggested "white-lining" Main street at the main cross streets in an effort to prevent accidents. Upon motion white lines will be placed on the center of Main street at New Haven, Market and Barbara streets. The lines will extend a distance of 75 feet on either side of said streets and autoists had better not cross these "dead lines" if they want to prevent accidents and prosecution as well. Cars travelling in the same direction should not pass each other at these points. President Fellenbaum recommended concreting Patterson alley from Main street North along properties of Mr. Clarence Schack and Mr. M. K. Brubaker to Apple Tree Alley. He also presented an ordinance regulating the work. The ordinance passed first reading.

**Water Committee**  
Mr. Eshleman reported the receipt of the cross heads to plungers for pump at the water works but that they were not yet installed. Engine at pumping station "went bad" but was repaired in several days.

**Finance Committee**  
Mr. Hauer reported the approval of the bills and all were later paid. The ordinance regulating the care of shade trees thru-out the boro was presented, read and passed first reading. The ordinance establishing a Tree Commission was also presented, read and passed first reading. The ordinance changing the name of West Donegal street from the Mennonite church west to the boro limits to Donegal Springs street, was presented, read and also passed first reading.

**Property Committee**  
Mr. Hauer stated that the committee met representatives of Friendship Fire Company and they discussed the hose drier question. He recommended the erection of a tower for the purpose as the best method here. The committee was instructed to procure the approximate cost of same until the next meeting. Mr. Hauer also stated that the Fire Company is at present considering the purchase of an auto truck upon which it will mount our present chemical outfit and then use the chemical truck as a supply truck.

**Light Committee**  
Mr. Eshleman reported all the lights in good shape.

**Geo. Shatz's Report**  
The pumping engineer reported as follows: Pumped by steam, 429,000 gallons in 24 hours; by water, 255,000 gallons in 24 hours and by gas-line engine, 151,000 gallons in 5 hours, a total of 4,695,000 for the month of July.

**Chief of Fire Co**  
L. G. Dillinger reported one fire in town and one out of town during July. The battery on the chemical went bad and a new one was purchased. The company also purchased 200 feet of hose for the chemical truck at a cost of \$70.00.

**Board of Health**  
Secretary Leib reported two nuisances the past month, one of which was abated and the other will be.

**Treasurer's Report**  
H. E. Hauer reported balances in the three accounts as follows: Boro, \$3,355.08; Water, \$2,656.08; Interest, \$608.00. Clerk Zeller read a bid from R. D. Wood & Co. on 1500 to 1800 feet of 12-inch iron pipe, which was \$60.90 per net ton F. O. B. Mt. Joy. These pipe weigh about 82 lbs. to the foot, making the total cost of the 1800 feet of pipe almost \$4,500. Council had contemplated laying a larger main from the reservoir to the boro in order to increase the pressure.

**Trouble About Ordinances**  
There was then quite a discussion relative to the ordinance presented for concreting Patterson alley. Mr. Garber, who is chairman of the ordinance committee, said that the ordinance was prepared by a private citizen and not the solicitor, that he understood said ordinance will be paid for by that citizen and that he was not consulted relative thereto. Also that when people want anything of that kind they present a petition and then if agreeable an ordinance follows. He was opposed to concreting the alley and said if it would have been repaired from time to time it would be in better shape.

George Neiss complained about the weeds in the alley along the east side of his Marietta street property. This matter will have the proper attention.

Reports were then made that Mr. Ebersole in the east end and H. A. Darrenkamp were anxious for grades so they could put down their pavements and gutters. There was no action as Council is waiting for the State Highway Department representatives who will assist in establishing a permanent curb line on Main street. In a letter from the department they expect to be here this week.

The Property committee was instructed to procure the estimated cost of a brick tower at the fire house for drying hose.

**Get Ten Days Notice**  
The collector of water rents reported a few delinquent tax payers. Council instructed him to give them the usual ten days notice and if not paid in that time Supervisor Smeltzer shall shut off the water. All bills were then paid and Council adjourned.
