STATE FUNDS ALLOTTED FOR MILLERSVILLE NORMAL

An appropriation of \$205,000 for maintenance and operating expenses and \$33,000 for alterations and repairs has been granted to the Millersville State Normal school by the State, according to Dr. J. George Pecht, superintendent of Public Instructions. While the sum granted for operating expenses is \$4,000 in excess of the amount asked by school officials, the amount granted for alterations and repairs is said to be far below that asked. The last appropriation to the school was \$205,000 for maintenance and \$38,000 for repairs and alterations.

"Hogging Off" Corn
 Allowing hogs to harvest part of the corn crop is a great labor saver and results in good pork gains. Dr. Hawner, of the extension staff at the Pennsylvania State College, recommends the practice. He states that ordinarily 7 to 8 shotes will harvest an acre of corn. He suggests turning in when the corn is fit to cut and shock.

150 MEN TO TRAIN FOR HIGHWAY PATROLMEN

Major Lynn G. Adams, superintendent of State police, began training 150 men to form the highway patrol authorized by the last legislature. He selected his candidates from a large number of applicants, and took them to state police training school at Mount Gretna for a course in highway laws and riding, and will then send them out on the roads to begin their duties.
 The men will be uniformed and will receive \$100 a month. Twenty-five will be stationed at Harrisburg for special work. Each of the five state police troops will receive a detachment of twenty-five. The men will not have power of arrest for violation of motor laws, but will take records of violations of laws and will have power of inspectors to weigh trucks for overweight. The patrolmen will then have to make information against violators who will be summoned before justices to answer the charges.
