PENNA. FARMERS USE MORE HIGH GRADE FERTILIZERS

Pennsylvania famers last year purchased 285,128 tons of commercial fertilizers, according to figures supplied to James W. Kellogg, chief Junior C. E. at 3:00 P. M. Miss of the Bureau of Chemistry, State Department of Agriculture. He expects the amount will be increased when complete reports are received Mid-week prayer service Wednes- by the Bureau of Statistics from the various counties.

Estimates place the retail value of the fertilizer at \$5,548,200, roughly distributed as follows: ammonia, \$1,543,600; phosphoric acid, \$3,-069,200, and potash, \$635,400.

Of the total amount, the number of tons of each kind of fertilizer

Complete fertilizers, 164,762 tons; mitrogen and phosphoric acid fertilizers, 2,920 tons; phosphoric acid and potash fertilizers, 22,240 tons; acid phosphates, 83,835 tons; ground bone, 3,600 tons; tankage, 1,321 tons; nitrate of soda, 2,5.9 tons; potash salts, 2,822 tons; sulphate of ammonia, 953 tons; dried blood, 35 tons; and miscellaneous, 131 tons.
