and 586 injured on State Highways during the last six months.

The majority of accidents continue to occur on dry, straight road sections, rather than on slippery curves-reports received by the State Highway Department show. This is not only true of the month of March, but of the period beginning October 1, last, when the Highway department began the compilation of accident data.

Since October 1, 1923, 698 accidents were reported to the department. Of this total 476 occurred on dry roads, 185 on roads that were wet and 37 on icy roads. Three hundred and forty-eight accidents (Turn to pave Four)
