Slight Reduction in Some Taxes

NO TAX ON ADMISSIONS UNDER FIFTY CENTS—CANDY TAXES ARE ALSO ELIMINATED

Lancaster county will save approximately one million dollars in Federal taxes, through the new tax bill signed by President Coolidge on Monday, Division Deputy Collector C. H. Martin, of the local revenue office, stated today.

There will be no relief for the cigar industry of this section because the tax rate on cigars and tobacco is not reduced by the new law.

Less Income Tax The corporation tax also remains unchanged, it being 12-1/2 per cent. of the net income.

The individual income tax in 1923 was \$483,813.76 and will be reduced 25 per cent under the new law...

Lancaster county is one of the state's important candy manufacturing centers and the tax on candy in 1923 amounted to a total of \$714,913.48 and this tax is repealed.

The \$27,000 received from the tax on jewelry in 1924 will be almost wiped out, as the new law imposes a tax only on an article of jewelry costing in excess of \$30.

There are some minor reductions or repeals, Mr. Martin says, but until he has gone over the act more carefully he cannot tell what figures to give to them...
