INDIGESTION **DYSPEPSIA**

The initial symptoms of indigestion are not will marked, and the condition is often ignored The initial symptoms of indigestion are not will marked, and the condition is often ignored at first. Later there is a sensation of pressure in the region of the stomach after meals, dizziness, heart flutter, shortness of breath, which may be releved by belching. The tongue is coated, a bad taste in the mouth, especially in the morning; foul reath, poor appetite, and even vomiting, are some of the symptoms when the disease has become well established. The early cases are well nourished, but if there is much vomiting, or if the appetite is poor or the food distresses too much there is loss of weight and debility.

The outlook for the average case is hopeful if not too far advanced, and even then the distressing symptoms may be relieved.

Rheumatism

Chronic rheumatism may follow an attack of acute rheumatism, or it may follow exposure to cold and dampness. There is little pain or stiffness in the joints as a rule, although there may be red-ness, tenderness and swelling. All symptoms may be worse in the morning, gradually becoming more bearable and disap-pearing during the day. One many joints may be attacked, the pain passing from one to another with intervals of more or less fredom from pain which seem to be depend-In ent on weather changes. long-standing cases there may be great deformity owing to shrinking of the soft parts with overgrowth of the bone.

In muscular rheumatism pain is present in the muscles and their attachments, and is known by various names ac-cording to the location attacked: Lumbago, Torticollis, Pleurodynia, etc. As a rule there is no fever; the pain is generally of an aching character, something severe, 'cutting or cramping, and may be constant or present only when the effected muscles are used: as Lumbago it affects the muscles of the lower back; as Torticollis it affects neck; as Pleurodynia, the intercostal
