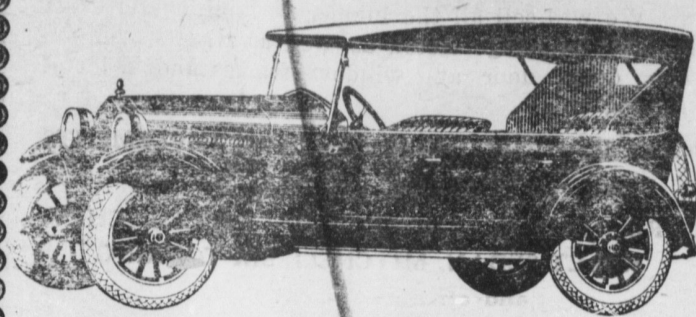

## Co. Farm Bureau

The purchase of nothing but certified disease-free potato seed and the introduction of Cobblers and White Rurals from several new seed sources are features of the fall cooperative purchase of potato seed stock by the Commodity Division of the Lancaster County Farm Bureau.

Several carloads of Cobbler seed were bought last year which did not come from certified seed sources. These did not prove very satisfactory and the purchases this year will be confined to certified seed only.

The introduction of North Dakota Cobblers into Lancaster County will be accomplished this fall for the first time. This seed has been tried out in this section in former years in an experimental way and proved itself productive of very good results. Two carloads of North Dakota Cobblers will come into the county this fall.

Growers will also be able to again secure their supplies of certified Vermont Cobblers through the Farm Bureau. Some of the fields in Vermont which furnished seed to Lancaster County last year that proved exceptionally good have been picked as the source this year. Other fields whose seed did not produce results as satisfactory will not provide seed for local growers.

For the growers who prefer to raise White Rurals instead of the Russet variety, Manager Hostetter has made arrangements for the purchase of 2 carloads of excellent seed stock of this variety from the northern part of Michigan. These potatoes have also gone through an intensive experimental stage in Pennsylvania and have yielded very good results.

The Russet seed will come from

the same growers in northern Michigan who have supplied county growers through the Farm Bureau for the past four years. Ever since the northern Michigan Russet variety has proved its great value as seed stock for Southeastern Pennsylvania, there have been quite a few Russet seed potatoes shipped in from Michigan by many other agencies beside the Farm Bureau. Practically all of this seed has been certified but has had its origin in those sections of Michigan which lay too far south. This southern grown seed is too mature and does not have the vitality which is necessary for successful results in this section. The prices of all the potatoes will be about \$1.65 per bushel.

### DEPARTMENT GATHERING NEW DATA ON PUREBRED LIVESTOCK

To obtain practical information on a number of questions on livestock improvement, the Bureau of Animal Industry is conducting a questionnaire investigation. Subjects covered by a series of questions on blanks which are being mailed to 5,000 stockmen include the cost of raising purebreds as compared with common stock, the marketing of purebred stock as meat animals, and several questions relating to registration of purebred livestock. A number of other topics on which information is lacking or is fragmentary are included.

The results of the questionnaire, department livestock specialists believe, will be of interest and value to the entire industry.

The development of the "Better sires—better stock" campaign, conducted by various States and the department, has resulted in a large list of livestock owners who are especially qualified to discuss methods of livestock improvement.
