School and hence would not affect
any department to any appreciable
extent and from an economic stand-
point non-resident pupils are an
asset to the district.

Question—What effect, if any,
would having non-resident pupils
have on tax rate?

Answer—It would require an
additional 3 to 3 1-2 mills increase
in present tax rate, on present as-
sessed valuation to make up for
loss, derived from non-resident pu-
pil's tuition last year.

Question—How much revenue
does the district derive annually
from non-resident pupils?

Answer—Non-resident pupils tu-
ition for 1923-24 term amounted to
\$4588.75.

Question—What was the addition-
al expense to the district last year
on account of the non-resident pu-
pils?

Answer—For text books and sup-
plies used by them approximately
\$525.00.

Question—Would same number of
teachers be required?

Answer—Yes all other expense of
the district would remain the same.
Question—Why not build an addi-
tion to present building?

Answer—This plan has been con-
sidered by board, and upon advice
from Dept. of Public Instruction,
and several architects as well as
the opinion of Board, the plan has
been discarded since an addition
would cost approximately \$40000.00
giving an additional four room
building and in a very few years
a crowded condition would exist
same as to-day. These four rooms
would be immediately occupied by
the division of our various grades,
and would provide no rooms for
High School use, and in this de-
partment we are especially crowded.

Easton P. Harriman, 530 West
136th street, New York. They were
treated in the Columbia Hospital.

Wrecked in Passing
The car alleged to have caused
the accident was a Ford truck driven
by Ogle, who was accompanied by
the Davis girl, Mary Albright and
Morgan. They were enroute from
York to Columbia.

Doherty and Harriman were on
their way from the west to their
homes and Mr. and Mrs. McCabe
left Philadelphia about nine o'clock
that night enroute to Blain county,
to visit Mr. McCabe's brother,
Joseph.

When passing the Strickler resi-
dence Ogle is alleged to have at-
tempted to pass the car occupied by
Doherty and Harriman. In doing
so the truck struck the rear end of
the car and was thrown across the
road into the front of the Ford
coupe, occupied by the McCabes,
traveling toward York.
