Corn and Tobacco Show This Week

EVERYTHING IS IN READINESS FOR THE BIG COUNTY EVENT TO BE HELD HERE FRIDAY AND SATURDAY.

Everything is rounding into shape for the Lancaster county corn and tobacco show to be held in the former market house building here on Friday and Saturday, January 16 and 17. The committee in charge has made great preparations, have it extensively advertised and we predict a big attendance.

There will be exhibits of corn and tobacco and the show is open to all. All exhibits must have been grown by the exhibitor. Only one exhibit in each class from the same can be shown.

All exhibits must be brought in before noon on Jan. 16. Exhibit open afternoon and evening.

Corn Exhibit.
The corn will be judged by Mr. E. J. Walters of State College. Following are the classes:

Messrs. Roy Nolt and P. W. Baker will judge this exhibit. An exhibit shall consist of fifteen leaves tied with another leaf. There will be three classes as follows:

The Lancaster News Journal will give a silver cup for the best exhibit of fillers at the show.

Despondent He Hangs Himself

JOHN H. GINDER, WELL KNOWN FARMER, COMMITS SUICIDE IN ATTIC OF HOME NEAR MASTERSVILLE

Despondent over ill health John H. Ginder, residing one mile north of Mastersville, committed suicide by hanging himself in the attic of a summer house, on his farm, Saturday afternoon.

The family are at a loss to know just what prompted his action and can attribute it only to the fact that he had been in ill health since he suffered a stroke of apoplexy two years ago.

After Mr. Ginder had eaten his dinner on Saturday he told his family that he was feeling tired and was going to retire to his bedroom. After being absent for a considerable time his son-in-law, Walter Brubaker, with whom he resided, went in search for him and found his body hanging from the rafters in the summer house. The strap which he used for a noose had been missing from the barn for several days.

Coroner Dr. J. D. Hershey, of Manheim, conducted an investigation and pronounced death due to suicide.

The deceased was 66 years of age and a member of the Church of the Brethren. He is survived by these children: Mrs. Hiram Gible, of Elizabethtown; Mrs. John Halde-man and Mrs. Walter Brubaker, of Manheim R. D. 4. Mrs. Monroe Fahnestock, Mt. Etna, Lebanon county. These brothers and sisters also survive: Marie S. Ginder, at home; Mrs. Joseph Meshey and Jacob F. Ginder, of Manheim R. D. 5. Twenty-nine grandchildren also survive.

Funeral services were held from his late home Tuesday afternoon, with further services in the Mastersville Brethren in Christ church, and burial was made in the adjoining cemetery.
