ANNUAL REPORT SHOWS MORE

PUPILS AND INCREASE IN TEACHERS

With the increase of nearly 1,000 pupils in Lancaster county schools and the engagement of 25 additional teachers, Lancaster county's school system is advanc.ng rapidly to a place among the leading school districts of this state.

Higher ratings for the county schools, better educated school teachers and other improvements are noted in the annual report of County School Superintendent A. P. Mylin.

According to the report 206 partial teaching certificates in the county this year were reduced to 173; 159 standard certificates have been increased to 165; 294 normal school certificates hafe been increased to (Turn to page three)






