caused by leaks and when the work is done the company's attorney be notified to that effect.

Mr. Barto, of the Street committee, reported rubbish hauled, weeds mowed, and work on relaying sidewalks, curbs and gutters down town is progressing very nicely.
Mr. Garber reported that there is still some complaint about the parking of automobiles in the vicinity of the Shoe factory. Also that there was some complaint about the water at the Daniel Derr property on West Main street, that Mr. Derr was notified and repaired same but not properly. Upon motion he will be notified to give the matter further attention.

Mr. Garber reported that to date \$5,217.52 worth of concrete work was done in the boro. Of this amount \$2,668.38 was paid by citizens and \$2,549.00 remains unpaid. The boro has paid for 2,438 square feet to date as its share of the work.

Mr. Zeller, of the Water Committee, reported minor repairs made to water works and recommended the laying of concrete on one of the bridges there instead of plank. Referred to the Water Committee.
If the work is done the tail race at the water works will be raised at points where it overflows.
Pumping Engineer Schatz reported having pumped 1,860,000 gallons by steam in 42 hours and 2,370,000 in 237 hours by water power during July.

The report of Geo. B. Zeller, treasurer, showed balances in the boro as follows: Boro, \$4,303.28; Water, \$1,001.88; Interest, \$560.00.
Upon motion Clerk Zeller was instructed to notify the Penna. R. Co. to repair the approaches to its bridges thruout the town. Secretary Zeller was also ordered to notify the Penna. R. R. authorities to discontinue all unnecessary blowing of train whistles while passing thru town at night.
Mr. Ross Eshleman asked if Council would provide a suitable place for a German field piece. Council agreed that our park would be an ideal place for it and decided to permit the American Legion to place it there and that the boro will maintain this German piece of ordinance.

Mr. Garber stated that the petition for the opening of the new street from Longenecker road west is now being circulated and is already numerously signed.
Bill to the amount of \$1,969.99 were then paid and Council adjourned.

FLAMES DESTROYED A BRICK SUMMER HOUSE

A one-story brick summer kitchen on the farm owned by H. S. Hershey, along the Manheim car line south of East Petersburg, was partially destroyed at 3 o'clock Friday morning by a fire thought to have been caused by an overheated stove pipe. The flames were discovered by William Springer, tenant of the farm house, and the East Petersburg Fire Company was immediately summoned. Their prompt arrival saved the farm house itself from catching fire, and kept the loss to an amount probably not exceeding \$400, caused by the destruction of the kitchen roof and damage to the interior.

THE BLACKBIRD SEASON IN PA. OPENED SATURDAY

County treasurers throughout Pennsylvania received supplies of the 1925 hunters license tags and are ready to start issuance for those hunters who desire to start the blackbird season which opened on Saturday. The license tags are good until April 30, 1926 and the resident fee is \$1.25 for both small and large game.
The 1925 tag design has been changed to dark blue with light yellow numerals on an aluminum base with all cross-lines eliminated. Over half a million tags are being distributed.

ELIZABETHTOWN

The citizens of Elizabethtown, and particularly those residing on Market street, will soon be relieved of the intolerable condition of this thoroughfare, since the installation of the sewer system. Both sides of this street having been torn up and practically no effort made to resurface it. Dust and mud intermittingly prevailing during the last few months. Efforts by Boro Council are directed in an effort to have the State Highway concrete this portion of the boro. Council officials were at Harrisburg to this end. The State officials stated it would be too late to consider putting down concrete this year, but work on a permanent roadbed would be started early next year. The State department will this week send a large force of men with the necessary machinery to resurface this road, which should be completed in a week or ten days.
