Destructive Fire

FOUR FRAME STABLES AND THEIR CONTENTS INCLUD-ING FOUR AUTOMO-BILES, WERE BURNED

Splendid work by members of Friendship Fire Company saved nearly a score of homes when one of the most spectacular fires in the history of the borough swept four frame stables on Hopewell street early Friday morning. The cause of the fire is undetermined. The loss is estimated at about \$25,000 partly covered by insur-

Shortly after 3 o'clock that morning, Joseph Kramer, who resides near the ruins of the buildings, was awakened by the roar of flames and the flickering light in the sky. An alarm was sent in and the firemen responded immed-

When firemen arrived on the scene one section of the building had collapsed and some of the houses along Hopewell street were scorching and threatening to burst into flames.
