## The Produce and Live Stock Market

CORRECT INFORMATION FURNISHED WEEKLY BY THE PENNA. BUREAU OF MARKETS FOR THE BULLETIN

### Feed Markets Firm

The feed situation is firm but quiet, with a fair demand for wheat feeds to go into storage. Prompt offerings of wheat feeds are firm and the mills are not anxious to sell futures. Offerings of wheat feeds are small. Oil meals are in plentiful supply. Corn feeds are also plentiful at firm prices.

### MARKET: Opening slow.

Beef steers compared with week ago steady, receipts mostly common and medium grades, bulk of sales \$7.70 to \$9.00. Bulls, she stock and canners practically unchanged. Stockers and feeders strong to 25c higher for better grades, common lightweights steady country demand active, noticeable improvement in quality, several loads sold around \$9.00, bulk \$6.25 to \$8.00. Calves steady to strong, top vealers \$14.50, few select \$15.00. HOGS: strong to 25c higher, top Westerns \$13.50, bulk \$13.00-\$13.25.

### Produce More Liberal

Fresh offerings of nearby fruits and vegetables were more liberal on the wholesale market. Grapes were stronger, while apples moved slowly. String beans continued firm, but lima beans and beets were weaker. Cabbage, cauliflower and corn showed stronger tendencies. Sweet potatoes sold at a wide range of prices. The first California tomatoes arrived on the market Thursday and met a fair demand.

### Potato Market Active

Potatoes met an active demand on the Philadelphia market Thursday, according to the State and Federal Bureau of Markets. Reports of a heavy snow fall in Maine preventing digging, and frost injury in Wisconsin have increased the speculative demand. Bulk Pennsylvania Round Whites from Bucks county topped the market, selling as high as \$3.00 per hundred pounds. Lehigh and Northampton county stock brought \$3.75 to \$4.00 per 150 pound sack. Reports from Upper Lehigh county, state that haulings are light due to the growers holding off on account of the rising market. The price paid to farmers in this section for bulk stock is \$1.25 per bushel at the car. Shipments from Pennsylvania are increasing and last week 395 cars were shipped compared with 135 for the same week last year.

### Apple Market Dull

The Philadelphia apple market was very dull this morning and there are too few sales of most lines to establish a market, according to the State and Federal Bureau of Markets. The liberal supply of drop apples from New Jersey was one factor that had a depressing effect on trading. A few cars of Pennsylvania grapes have been appearing on the market this week. The market showed a slightly firmer tendency, in spite of the very heavy receipts of Western juice grapes. There was little activity on the cabbage market, due to the warmer weather. Western iceberg lettuce was lower in price and trading slowly. Potatoes were held at higher prices but there was little trading. Pennsylvania U. S. No. 1 Round Whites were quoted at \$4.25 to \$4.35 per 150 pound sack. Bulk stock brought \$3.00 per hundred pounds. New Jersey string beans were generally of ordinary quality and prices were lower. Lima beans and sweet potatoes were weaker. Beets and carrots moved slowly. Pennsylvania celery was mostly of good condition and sold at firm prices. Sweet corn offerings were light and trading slow.

## Mount Joy's New School Building

for the local pupils who attend school in the local building having Domestic Science and Manual Training among its most important subjects. This will be quite an improvement for the local school and the citizens of this town should be thankful that this course will make the local high school rank among the best in Lancaster County.

The basement will be composed of a gymnasium, 35 feet by 60 feet two locker rooms, two shower rooms, a gallery for spectators of local High School basketball gym, a room in which manual training will be taught, the furnace room, a room in which domestic science will be taught, storage room, and a janitor's room.

The first floor will contain a modern auditorium, 35 feet by 60 feet, which includes a stage 12 feet by 60 feet, the principal's office, a public office, a first class library, two class rooms, and cloak rooms.

The second floor will contain the laboratory, and a gallery, adjacent to the auditorium. A few other small rooms are also on the second floor. A total of seven class rooms will be in the new building, and the seating capacity of each class room will be thirty pupils. Lockers will be installed and a pleasant dressing room back of the stage will be of use to local theatre stars, when they perform on the stage.

A baseball diamond and football field together with a track will also be built, thereby caring for the physical inclinations of any student who attends the local high school.

## ROWENNA MAN INJURED; COMPANION WAS KILLED

For five hours, Jacob Ziegler, son of J. H. Ziegler, Rowenna, lay pinned beneath the tonneau of an automobile beside his dead companion.

The story of the tragedy which came near costing the former Lancaster county his life is told in newspaper reports from New Bern, N. C., and in a letter received at Rowenna by the Ziegler family. The younger Ziegler is in a New Bern hospital recovering from his injuries. Ziegler, who is part owner of a jewelry store in New Bern is inspector of watches for the Norfolk-Southern railroad, was riding in an automobile driven by H. W. Oliver, railroad superintendent of bridges and buildings, when the machine was wrecked.

Oliver was entangled in the seat of the machine as it hurtled to its side, and was crushed to death. Ziegler, although he sought to leap, was pinned to the ground at the waist by the machine as it fell and was unable to extricate himself. He lay there in agony five hours before help came.

Ziegler, a veteran of the World War, left Lancaster county a number of years ago and lived in New Bern before and after the war. In a letter to his father he says he suffered no broken bones and that he is now improving rapidly.
