Wounds Fatal To Florn Man

CHARLES SWEAGER, SHOT BY GEO. HENDERSON IN DUEL DIES OF INJURIES

Charles Sweager, by Seed of Florin, who was shot by Geo. Henderson, also of Florin, during the sweater duel in a house in Charles Sweager, 36 years old, a revolver duel in a house in Perry county last Tuesday night, succumbed to his wounds at 9:45 last Wednesday morning at the Polyclinic Hospital, in Harrisburg.
Sweager lingered between life and death since he was admitted to the hospital. Part of his right lung had been torn away by the bullet from Henderson's gun, which ploughed its way into the man's spinal column, fracturing it and

resulting in complete paralysis of His condition was so critical that surgeons could not probe for the bullet, fearing that such an operation would be fatal.

Sweager's body was removed from the hospital by the Coroner and taken to Hauck's undertaking establishment, on Third street, Har-

risburg.

Henderson has been held in the jail at New Bloomfield on a charge of aggravated assault and battery since the shooting. State Troopers, who arrested him, said at that time he likely would be charged with murder should Sweager die. Sweager, according to a statement credited to him after the shooting, admitted that he started the shooting and that Henderson fired only after his life had been threatened.
