torney Rehm was not acquainted with the facts when he wrote the letter, and claimed that Mrs. Sweger admitted to them in Perry county that she failed to tell the lawyer that Ricedorf had legally adopted the child on November 10.

Several days ago Mrs. Sweger told Major Rehm that a few days after the fatal shooting of her husband, Ricedorf appeared at the home of her father, Ross Leonard, Juniata Valley, Perry county, and took away the girl under false pretenses. He then wrote the letter. Armed with this document and accompanied by a highway patrolman who believed her pathetic story, the woman was enabled to obtain the girl from a school in Florin. Both went to Mrs. Sweger's father's home.

Later it developed, state police say, that Mrs. Sweger had not told the entire truth to Attorney Rehm. They say that she placed the child with the Messiah Orphanage at Florin, shortly after the shooting and that on November 10, Ricedorf adopted it. There are papers to prove this fact, they say. Catherine has been subpoenaed by Perry county authorities to appear in court there this week to tell her tale of how Henderson shot her father during an argument at the home of Mrs. Sweger's father on October 22.

Sweger was shot during a duel in a darkened room after he had fired a shot at Henderson, according to Sweger's dying statement and testimony of other witnesses.

weapon shows signs of having been used by some valiant warrior, the blade being unusually keen for such a relic.

It is black in color and on one end has two grooves to which were probably fastened a handle. The blade has been rubbed and polished, resulting in a keen edge. Another interesting relic is an old Indian arrow head, gray in color. Both these relics were found on the Metzger farm, close to Falmonth more than 30 years ago.

In addition to these Indian relics Mrs. Metzger has an old bottle of fancy design which was made in the year 1835 and was used by Carrot and Co., of St. Louis, Mo., and Norfolk, Va. The bottle, peculiarly enough, contains the name of "Jenny Lind," the great Swedish Nightingale, who came to this country in 1850. There is also a portrait of the singer and a picture of the home where she was born.

Another bottle, said to be 75 years old, and probably used by the Quakers, is also in the collection.
