RECEIVE POST CARD AFTER EIGHT YEARS From Wednesday's New Era: The New Era received a post-card in the mail this morning bearing the date line of Tekniske Skole, Horten, Norway, June 10, 1918.

The communication, which is signed by T. R. Petersen, formerly of Mount Joy, reads as follows: "Dear Sir:—As the mail service to America is very uncertain on account of the war, I am sending a greeting to my friends in Lancaster county via the Pole."

Eight years have elapsed since the card left the Arctic regions until it reached its destination at the New Era office.

The card bears a Norwegian stamp and in four different languages, also bears the following: "This card will be carried by the 'Maud' across the Polar Sea, and afterwards conveyed by post to the addressee."

On the opposite side of card is the print of a man dressed in furs and on skis with an Eskimo dog. The background of the picture is a scene of the frozen sea with a ship anchored among the mountains of ice.

Petersen's family connections cover a portion of Donegal twp., but he left this section years ago. The card, apparently, was almost eight years in reaching its destination.
